BRITISH GOODS FOR CANADIAN TRADE

Germany Fraudulently Marking Their Goods With English Names.

"The marking of goods with their country of origin is going to have an excellent effect on British trade in Canada, and I only wish it could be brought into force earlier than September 1, the date named by Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance, in his Budget speech," replied Capt. J. Edwards, Senior British Trade Commissioner, Montreal, in reply to a request for his views on this important change in our importing system, to enable Canadian customers to know just what goods they are buying. "Examples of foreign goods masquerading as British or Canadian are continually being brought to my notice. Some of these deceptions are of no moment and some are made innocently, such as the Japanese manufacturer who marks his goods with the word 'Nippon.' Nippon is their native word for Japan, but probably most people who appear as the registered mark name of a Canadian or British maker.

"Other cases of improper marking are intentionally fraudulent," continued Capt. Edwards, "such as the marking of German manufacturers with English cities. I get not a few samples of German manufacturers, for instance, with the name 'Sheffield' on them as if they came from the celebrated cutlery centre. That is the mark of fraud, done deliberately to mislead buyers. At one time it was possible to detect this fraud, if one was acquainted with the appearance of German printing which, even in Roman type, is different to English; but some German printers have secured fonts of English type, so that means of detection goes, and as they have learned the need of using good English translators it is often not possible to see even from their catalogues where the goods were made.

"As the Minister of Finance remarked, in his Budget speech, the Canadian public has a right to know from where they are buying, and if you go into any store and ask for Canadian or British goods you will quickly find how hard it is to find them. In the ramifications of business goods pass from one merchant to another, and finally to the retailer, who cannot possibly tell, in many cases, where the goods

DOES A COLLEGE EDUCATION PAY?

Daily Star Gives a Few Convincing Facts That It Does.

"Does it pay to give your boy a college education," asked "The Star" Montreal, in a recent editorial. Of course it does, and "The Star" proves it in a most convincing manner.

"The better advised young men," it continues, "set themselves first to buy their freedom from that bitterest of slavery, the grinding necessity to devote all their energies to keeping one short jump ahead of the wolf. Freedom is the greatest boon that any human creature can covet, and under modern economic conditions, it is enjoyed by those who are at ease as to their ability to make a living. If a college education led to penury or inadequately endeavor, then it would be much worse than a waste of time—it would be a false finger-post directing inexperienced youth down a tragical wrong road."

To those who think, genuinely, that this is the effect of four years at college, "The Star" comments a little calculation made by an American life insurance company, as to conditions in the United States. We quote:

"It was found that, roughly, only one man in a hundred is a college graduate; and yet this one per cent. of the male population has furnished 55 per cent. presidents of the United States, 54 per cent. vice-presidents of the United States, 36 per cent. members of Congress, 47 per cent. speakers of the House, 62 per cent. secretaries of the treasury, 67 per cent. attorneys general, and 69 per cent. justices of the supreme court. That is, an American boy who goes to college multiplies his chances of becoming president, a justice of the supreme court, or a prominent public servant or some other sort, by from fifty to seventy per cent. Doubtless a similar proportion holds in Canada. Out of our nine premiers since Confederation, five were college men.

"That is one measure which shows how much it pays to go to college."

LABOR MATTERS IMPROVING

Show That Steady Improvement is Reported—Cost of Living.

Ottawa, June 20.—At the beginning of May employment among the unions in Canada was 16.27 per cent. of the total membership as compared with 16.48 per cent. at the beginning of April and 2.32 per cent. at the beginning of May, 1920, according to the June issue of the Labor Gazette. Returns from 6,000 firms indicated a slow but steady improvement.

The cost of the weekly family budget of staple goods continues to decline. The average cost at the beginning of May was \$12.25, as compared with \$12.68 in April and \$10.85 in May, 1920.

The time lost during May from industrial disputes was greater than during April and also greater than during May, 1920. In May, 1921, there were forty-five strikes, involving about 8,236 working people and causing a loss of 163,320 working days. There were twenty-six strikes on record at the end of the month, involving about 6,709 working people.
