CHURCH UNION
The Toronto Globe finds that the question of Union with the Methodist and Congregational churches as submitted to the Presbyterians of the Dominion a few weeks ago, is being marked by want of enthusiasm and general lack of interest from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The time limit granted by the Assembly expired last Sunday, with the result that only 1-4 of the congregations declared themselves and in consequence the time limit has been extended for another Sunday.

The want of interest taken in the question is being accounted for by the fact that the leaders of the Anti Unionists assure the continuance of the Presbyterian church by the result of the voting what it may.

On the North Shore only two congregations voted, St. John's 2 to 1 in favor, and St. Stephen's, Redbank 43 to 1 against. In city of St. John only two out of ten churches balloted and while these two strongly supported union four years ago, this time they went strongly against it.—Gazette.

Who died on the field of honour on October 13th. He was only 19 years of age. He was one of that brave band of heroes who charged the mined German crater and gave his life for his God, his King and his Country.

TO RAISE FRENCH-ACADIAN BATTALION

Meeting of Representatives Held at Moncton to Make Arrangements

While in the city last evening, Captain L. F. B. Bille, of St. John held a consultation with French speaking representatives from various parts of the province, concerning the changes for the formation of a distinct regiment from among the French-speaking people of the Province of New Brunswick. The meeting was a quite representative one.

For various reasons, the promoters of the movement are not publishing many details, but it is understood that the idea of such a regiment is being received with favor throughout the province, and that it only remains to secure the necessary officers of French speaking origin. A well-known militia officer from the North Shore, is slated for the position of commanding officer (Major, or Lieut.-Colonel), providing he can make the business arrangements necessary to equip the appointment.

The committee which met here in L'Assomption, N.B. last night, is sending out a call for more delegates from parts of the province not previously represented, and it is expected that a meeting of a provincial committee will be held here within a few days.—Friday's Transcript.
