In the later stages of the disease the mucous membrane of the larger bronchial tube softens, while in the smaller tubes and air cells of the lungs the mucous membrane becomes congested and in-flamed. There are no cavities nor tubercles in the lungs, but merely a wasting away of the larger bronchial tubes, and death takes place from obstruc-tion of the bronchial tubes and air-cells of the larger the patient dies from exhaustion and suffocation, being unable to expectorate the mucous which accu-mulater in the passage leading to the lungs, which are commonly copious, of a light straw or yellowish green. Oftentimes streaks of blood make their ap-pearance in the mucous, and at times there is a dis-agreeable smell.
