## Obituary of Mr. Jarvis Westgate

One of the last of the old pioneers of the township of Warwick passed away on the morning of July 8th, in the person of Mr. Jarvis Westgate, 5th con. E. S. R., at the age of 80 years, 1 month, 16 days. He had been in ill-health for many years, but the shock sustained from a fall on Saturday, July 4th, was the immediate cause of his death. Mr. Westgate was born at Castlebar, Co. Mayo, Ireland, and came to this country with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Westgate, in the early forties. They settled on the 5th con. east, S. E. R., where he spent his life with the exception of three years, when he held a government position in Kerwood. On Feb. 11th, 1864, he married Miss Mary Jane Buchanan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Buchanan, of the township of Metcalfe, Middlesex county. To them were born eleven children, all of whom survive him except John, who died at the age of 8 months, and Joseph S. Y., at the age of 18 years, 10 months, in 1899. Besides his devoted wife, the surviving members of the family are: his only daughter, Mrs. Ed. King, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.; and eight sons: Jarvis T. Francis, Sask.; William, 4th line east, Warwick; M. Hamilton, Foxleigh east, and A. Walter, Regina, Sask., were called home last week by the death of their father, the late Jarvis Westgate.

Thomas Stephenson, a former resident of Plympton, died at Minnedosa, Man., lately. He was an Englishman by birth and lived on the 10th line for many years.

Albert Huggard, an expert oil driller of Petrolea, died in Madagascar last month. He had only been there about a month and was fifteen days' travel from a doctor. He was 39 years old and leaves four children.

Arthur McCutcheon, son of Mr. and Mrs. James McCutcheon, formerly of Petrolea, died in Oshawa last week as the result of injuries received when a large boiler on a drilling rig exploded several days previous. Deceased was nineteen years of age.

Mr. J. Kennedy, townline, Plympton, very nearly lost his house by fire a few days ago. A lamp in an incubator in an upstairs room exploded, and when noticed by his son, the room was all on fire. By hard work, however, they succeeded in getting it under control.
