BROOKE COUNCIL.

Alvinston, 15th December, 1914.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.

Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. McCabe, were approved and signed.

Mr. M. Coleman applied for remuneration for one lamb killed and one worried by dogs, valued at \$12.00; James Griffith one ewe killed, valued at \$12.00; Thos. Sisson, several injured, valued at \$15.00; Hugh Kennedy, one ewe killed, valued at \$12.00; and Douglas McIntyre, one sheep and one lamb killed and twelve injured, valued at \$50.00.

Bourne—Campbell, that Mr. Coleman be paid the sum of \$8.00; Mr. Griffith the sum of \$8.00; Mr. Sisson the sum of \$10.00; Mr. Kennedy the sum of \$8.00, and Mr. McIntyre the sum of \$33.33.—Carried.

Notice received from Frank Bell, for-bidding the payment of any more money on unfurnished work on town line drain. Referred to drain commissioner.

Notice received from J. McDougall,

that he was suffering damages from defects in the McDougall drain.

Annett—Bourne, that notice be referred to Commissioner Darvill, with request to take action to remedy grievance.—Carried.

Notice received from Auld & Matthews

asking the sum of \$20.00 for damage to their auto by defect in Nauvoo road. No action.

Albert McCabe reported on the wire fence erected by Mrs. Mugan, and, on her signing an agreement to cut the hedge down at least twice a year, in case it grew up from the old road, she was paid the sum of \$98.97.

Kennedy—McCabe, that the sum of \$23.57 be paid for tile used on 9-10 side-road, concession 13.—Carried.

Mr. Annett, as chairman of the Local Board of Health, handed in the annual report of same.

McCabe—Kennedy, that report be accepted and ordered printed for the sum of \$42.00, in remuneration of members and payment of expenses.—Carried.

By-law No. 22 introduced and read to levy pro rata the sum of \$211.84 on lots assessed for 7-8 concession blind line drain, being the overpayment on drain when completed.

Kennedy—Campbell, that by-law be read a third time and carried and debentures issued for full cost of work.—Carried.

W. J. Bourne, Esq., commissioner in charge of the Morley-Zavitz drain, handed in his report on the completion of the work:—

Yeas—Annett, Bourne, Campbell.

Mr. Kennedy handed in an itemized statement in connection with trip to Ottawa, showing his cash outlay to have been \$17.75.

Campbell—Bourne, that the Parker-Lucas drain by-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Annett—McCabe, that in the opinion of this council, any member of same who may have been appointed a commissioner over a drain, should resign the position of commissioner, if he is not a member of council for the following year.—Carried.

Yeas—Annett, Bourne, Campbell, McCabe. Nays—Kennedy.

McCabe—Bourne, that a vote of thanks be tendered the Reeve and Clerk for their able, efficient and courteous services during the year now drawing to a close.—Carried.

Reeve and Clerk acknowledged the compliments shown them.

Bourne—Campbell, that Council do now adjourn sine die.—Carried.

Casualties 253 in One Week

London, Dec. 3.—The official officers' casualty list for the week ended November 30 was made public to-day. It shows that in these seven days the British forces on the continent lost 79 officers killed and 141 wounded, and that 33 were reported missing. This gives a total of 253 for the week. Added to the previous totals, the last report shows that since the outbreak of hostilities Great Britain has had 986 officers killed and 1,918 wounded, while 582 have been reported missing. The total of casualties of officers up to date is therefore 3,466 men.

A sad accident occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. Luther, of Grand Bend, on Saturday, Dec. 5th at 5 p. m. Mrs. Luther went out and left the two children alone. She had only been out about ten minutes, when she came in and found her baby boy, Norman Wilson, aged 1 year, 6 months and 28 days, sitting on the steps with his clothes in flames. She succeeded in extinguishing the fire but too late to save his life. He lived about six hours.
