Italy has, at last, fully identified herself with the Allies, and, now, instead of the Triple Entente, there is the Quadruple Entente or Alliance. The terms of the Alliance as before agreed upon by the three signatories, read thus:-

"Paris, Sept. 4, 1914. The undersigned, duly authorized thereto by their respective governments hereby declare as follows; The British, French, and Russian Governments mutually engage not to conclude peace separately during the present war. The three governments agree which will involve the leading finanthat when the terms of peace come to be discussed, no one of the Allies will demand terms of peace without the previous agreement of each of the other Allies, signed, Paul Cambon, Count Benckendorff, Edward Grey." 




