## TO PROTECT FOREST WEALTH

Mr. Barnum Engages Chief Forester And Will Start Nursery For Benefit of Farmers And Land Owners.

Nova Scotians interested in the handling and conservation of the timberlands and woodlots will, as a result of the efforts of Frank J. Barnum, have the benefit of expert advice on this vitally important question. Mr. Barnum has, on his own account, engaged O. Schierbeck, formerly chief forester for Price Brothers, Quebec.

Mr. Schierbeck, who is a Dane, was the winner of Mr. Barnum's \$5,000 prize, which was open to world competition, for the best method of suppression and combating the spruce budworm, bark beetle and borer. This treatise was printed and given free distribution by Mr. Barnum and it is now to be found in the libraries of all forest schools on the continent. Mr. Schierbeck is one of the best equipped foresters in North America, as in addition to his high qualification as a forester, is a forest insect entomologist and has had a wide experience in nursery work and planting and seeding for reforestation, in addition to being a practical woods operator, and fire prevention expert, as well. Nova Scotians should feel greatly encouraged in having a man of such outstanding ability and attainments located in the province.

Mr. Schierbeck passed his examination at the University of Copenhagen, Denmark, after a seven years' course in forestry and since graduating has had 19 years' experience in practical forestry, of which eight years was with the Danish Government Forest Service, eight years being spent in Canada, the past four years of which as chief forester for Price Bros. Company, Quebec, one of Canada's largest, most successful and progressive paper companies, whose limits are equal in extent to one half the area of the entire province of Nova Scotia. During his employment with Price Bros., Mr. Schierbeck has had full charge of all fire protection on these vast limits, giving him a large experience in this now all important part of forest conservation.

## AUTUMN'S GLORY

It is with the reverence of an artist that we open our eyes to the annual glory of Autumn. For it is a living and potent reality, part and parcel of all-embracing truth. Its psychic side may be wrought with mystery, but it is just as real and true as are the more material blessings of Autumn, which we enjoy but see no mystery in. The tinted leaf and the glamor of the harvest-moon minister to us just as effectively as does the harvest itself.

And it is here. It is here, with its golden sunshine, its flaming forests, its dull red marches, its penecostal morning branch, its sunsets of unrepentant splendor, and its brilliant, stately nights. The earth, as well as the heavens, are "telling" the "glory" of Almighty Love, whose hand alone can paint the nights and shadows, the gorgeous and the subdued hues we see on tree and plain and mountain-side—and the unseen colors sensed only by the receptive soul of men.

Blessing the farms through all thy vast domain.

There is no particular day when Autumn begins or ends, but roughly speaking this season runs from the Autumnal equinox, in the latter part of September, until Thanksgiving. Just as Winter may be dated from Thanksgiving till the vernal equinox in March. But the climax, the full prime, of Autumn's glory, is reached in October, whose virile and magnificent splendor stands out in high relief in contrast with the gradual fading of the Summer seen in September and the sombre but tender withdrawal of Autumn which lends such a peculiar charm to much of November. There is a certain sadness tingling all the weeks of Fall, but sadness is not Autumn's dominant note. As might be the case were it not for the paramount influence of October's brilliance and joyous bounty; more than any month in the year October represents the triumphant sentiment of consummation, and thus furnishes the keynote of Autumn's rich and complex theme.



## NEW WAREHOUSE UP-TO-DATE IN ITS APPOINTMENTS

Berwick-Mention was made recently of the Berwick Fruit Company's fine new apple warehouse, the largest of its kind in Canada. But while it is the largest it is not by any means the only up-to-date and modernly equipped warehouse in Berwick and vicinity. There are many others. S. B. Chute, with 25,000 barrels of apples grown in his orchards, requires a warehouse of his own, and has a large one adjoining that of the Berwick Fruit Company. Besides these three are three other large warehouses close by. Last year the well known Berwick fruit grower, John Buchanan, built a new warehouse at Waterville, three miles from Berwick. The building is 130 feet long by 50 feet wide, has three floors, and has electric light and power. Its equipment is about the most up-to-date of any in the Valley, and includes a Cutter Grader, a wonderful piece of machinery, imported from the United States.

Not so many years ago the apples were all sorted and graded by hand, a slow and tiresome process, and not good for the fruit. Now all the warehouses are equipped with graders of one kind and another, but the Cutter is the most intricate and efficient yet made. It is run by electric power, and has a capacity for a barrel of apples a minute. It takes the apples from the barrel and carries them along sorting and grading them as they go, and requires thirty people to tend it when it is running up to capacity.

Harry Thomas, of Berwick, is the manager of the warehouse, and keeps things humming. Mr. Buchanan is one of our most progressive fruit growers and is not afraid to try out new ideas and methods in the growing and packing of his fruit. He is putting up a good many apples in boxes this season. The apples are future be pretty generally adopted.
