GET THE DICTIONARY HABIT.

A great scholar once declared that
no man is educated until he has
learned how and when to use the
dictionary. Many people seem to
think their need of a dictionary
ceases when they quit school. The
only use they seem to be able to
make of such an unwieldy book is to
hold the door open on a warm
day. But not many ever outgrow
the dictionary. A gray-haired Amer-
ican educator says that in his youth
he used to look forward to the time
when it would be unnecessary for
him to refer to his dictionary to set-
tle the linguistic disputes. But the
time has never come. In his old
age he finds that he must turn more
and more to his trusty guide as the
years pass by. He has learned that
the need of a dictionary increases
with the increase of knowledge and
experience.

A good dictionary is more than a
mere list of definitions arranged in
alphabetical order; it is a book con-
taining thousands of useful facts
compressed within the smallest pos-
sible space. Remember the man
who spent fifteen minutes every day
reading the dictionary. Later when
he was elected to Congress his col-
leagues marvelled at his great store
of practical knowledge. Yet he had
never gone to school a day in his
life. He learned from his dictio-
nary what others acquired by spend-
ing years in college.

This proves, as Dr. Fernald says,
that the dictionary knows more than
any one man. It also has a better
memory. The person who keeps a
right hand acquaintance with his
dictionary never stops learning; he
goes to school all his life to the most
accomplished of all teachers.

Every household should have a
point out which particular one is
best, but it should be selected with
care. There are dictionaries and
dictionaries-their name is legion.
The most important thing to bear in
mind in selecting a dictionary is that
you judge it by its cover or the kind
of paper it is printed on. Neither
is it necessary a good one because
your great grandmother had one
like it. Some dictionaries are good,
others are fair, and still others are
abominable. But any kind is better
than none. If you can't afford a
new one get a poor one-but get
one. The best of us will never learn
all there is in the poorest dictionary
published. Before making the pur-
chase consult someone in a position
to judge. The essential thing is to
get one that is suited to your need
and use it.


