> I note in the third place, the equipment needed. It is threefold: Montal, Physical and Spiritual. Of mental training, let every young man secure the very best within his reach. Knowledge is power. There is no good excuse for ignorance to day. Of physical fitness let a word or two suffice. Keep pure, avoid sin, be sober in all things. Remember that your body is the handiwork of God, fearfully and wonderfally made; it is the "stemple of the Holy Spirit. If any man defile the temple of God.him shall God destroy."

> But mental and physical equipment will not by themselves secure the highest good : pure noble actions can only spring from a pure and, noble soul. Men must be not only clever but good, not only wise but Godly. Are you a Christian? If not you never can be a success.
