every congregation and mission station within the bounds. Rev. J. Gordon gave a statement of the state of the Presbytery Fund, and requested the appointment of auditors. Messrs. W. J. Clark and Dr. Arnot were appointed auditors, and Mr. Gordon was authorized to meet all indebtedness from the funds in hand, and give in the report at next meeting of Presbytery. The best methods of raising money for the Schemes of the Church were discussed. On motion, duly seconded, it was agreed that it be an instruction to Moderators of Sessions to bring the matter of contributing to the Schemes of the Church before their several congregations, that the clerk of the Presbytery correspond with Moderators, requesting them to report their action to him, and report at January meeting. Dr. Thompson asked and obtained the Presbytery's And contained the Presbytery's sanction to carrying on the Session's work at Aylmer by the aid of two elders from Springfield until elders were elected. The Presbytery adjourned to meet at Dutton, on Monday, 9th January, 1893, at 4 pm. and closed with the benediction.—GEORGE SUTHERLAND, Pres. Clerk.

THE PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.-This Presbytery met at Barrie 29th November, attended by eighteen ministers and twelve elders, Mr. Leishman in the chair. A call from the congregation of Collingwood to Rev. D. L. McCrae, M.A., Ph.D. was sustained, and arrangements made for his induction to the pastoral charge on January 17 should he accept. A call from the congregations of Penehe accept. A call from the congregations of Pene-tanguishene and Wyebridge was also sustained to Rev. J. R. Craigie, and like arrangements made for his induction on January 3 in the event of his accepting the charge. A petition signed by forty-five persons residing in Everett asking that a mis-sion station be organized there was received, and supported by Messers. Thomas Tate and W. Foster. It was agreed that the sessions of Burns Church, Essa, and Alliston be consulted in this matter. Essa, and Alliston be consulted in this matter, and a committee was appointed for that purpose. and a committee was appointed for that purpose. The members of this committee are Mr. Leishman, Moderator; Messrs Findlay, McLeod, ministers, and Mr. W. V Brown, elder. A communication from the Board of Managers of North Bay congregation was read and supported by Mr W. McKenzie. Secretary of the Board. The paper set forth the difficulties experienced in getting a settled pastor. The managers propose to raise their contributions from \$5500 per annum to \$500, and desire a supplefrom \$550 per annum to \$800, and desire a supplementory grant from the Augmentation Fund of \$300, so as to give a stipend of \$1,100 This grant is \$50 less than they formerly received from the fund. The Presbytery expressed sympathy with the congregation as well as pleasure on account of their liberality, and agreed to ask the grant named from the Augmentation Committee. It was agreed to meet at Waubaushene on December 13 for the trials of Rev. W. A. Wylie, and should these be sustained, for his ordination and induction as mis sionary; Mr. James to preside, Mr. Bethune to preach, Mr. Grant to address the missionary and Dr. Gray the congregation. A resolution of sympathy with the widow and family of the late Wm. Smart, elder of Beeton Church, and at the time of his death a member of Presbytery, and with the Beeton congregation was adopted. Mr. Findlay was appointed to organize a Mission Station at Edenvale, a petition from twenty persons in that locality having been received for organization. Mr. Carswell, convener of the Statistical Committee reported on the statistical and financial returns of 1891 as compared with the previous year, and was in-structed to have 300 copies of his report printed for circulation. The Presbytery's convener on Home Missions was instructed to allocate to the congregations in the bounds their proportion of \$2,000 and \$600 asked from them for the Home Mission and Augmentation funds. Messrs Carswell and Burnett were appointed to wait upon the Rev. Dr. Fraser during the session to hear the respects of the brethren and to erquire as to his health, and brought backa pleasing report. Sundry other mat-ters not calling for special mention were attended

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG. -The Presbytery of Winnipeg met on the 17th November. There were present: Rev J A. Sutherland (moderator), foutteen ministers and seven elders. Members is succession reported that they had as previously appointed dispensed the communion in seventees mission stations. Comments accompanying threports indicated that decisive progress had been made in the various departments of Christian work in these fields, although in most cases the missionaries were young men with little experience, but with unbounded enthusiasm and interest. It was agreed that Rev. Mr. MacFarlane be authorized to organize formally the congregation at Clearspin s, and if it appears advisable to him and his session he was authorized to appoint elders and establish a session. The Rev. James Douglas tendered hiresignation of his charge of Blythheld, Starbuck and Headingley. A deputation was present consisting of Messrs. I. II. Francis and II. Hilton of Headingley, G. and A. Parker of Blythfield, R. and A. Houston of Starbuck. The Rev. Mr. Douglas stated his resignation was due chiefly to the fact that he finds it too heavy a tax upon his strength to overtake his work in so widely scattered a district, especially in winter time, when the roads between Headingley and the southern part of his district are practically impassable. He is also discouraged by the fact that several families, numbering in all twenty-eight persons, have left the neigh-borhood of Starbuck for the Souris coal fields and other families are about to leave. The commissioners each spoke briefly and bore testimony to the high esteem in which Mr. Douglas is held, and to the regret of the congregation at a possible severance of the pastoral tie, but agreeing that the considerations alleged by Mr. Douglas were serious hindrances to success in carrying on services in the field. It was agreed after lengthy discussion that Mr. Douglas' resignation be laid on the table for the present and that the matter of rearrangement. of the district be referred to the Home Mission Committee with a view of retaining the services of Mr. Douglas, the matter to be brought up at a meeting of the Presbytery to be held the next Monday evening. A petition, asking for the organization of a new Presbyterian congregation in the west central part of the city of Winnipeg was laid before the Presbytery, with some fifty-x signatures. Messrs. C.H. Campbell, H. Crowe, W. D. Russell and R. H. Shanks, who had been appointed to appear on behalf of petitioners, each of the district be referred to the Home Mission Comappointed to appear on behalf of petitioners, each made a short statement, asking that the petition begranted, on the ground that the increase of church accommodation has not kept pace with the recen-growth of population, and that there is a prospecof establishing a self-supporting congregation in the neighbourhood indicated, without detriment to existing churches. It was agreed on motion of Chief Justice Taylor, seconded by Dr. Bryce, that the petition be received and sent to the sessions of other congregations of the city so that they may appear for their interest at the next session of the Presbytery to be held in Knox Church on Friday. December 2nd, at 3.30 p.m., an evening meeting on the same day to be held in Kildonan for the induction of Rev. Wm. McKinley, of Minnedo a, who has accepted a call to the pastorate of that congregation. Rev. A. Hamilton, of Stoney II. congregation. Rev. A. Hamilton, of Stonew.P. was appointed to meet the petitioners for the establishment of a new congregation in the city and to obtain information and report. Discussion on the overture for the division of the Presbytery, pospourd from last meeting, was resumed by the Rev. John Pringle, of Port Arthur, who urged that a new Presbytery be formed in that part of the Pre-bytery nowincluded in Ontario and including the corgrega-tions of Keewatin, Rat Portage, Fort William, Port Arthur, Schreiber, and associated mission fields. After a discussion, in which Mr. Pringle was supported by Mr. Naim and several members of the western part of the Presbytery, the matter was posiponed until Monday next to discover whether the engregation of Keewatin, which has no yet bren


