The Presbytery of Halifax met Sept. 8th. The call from the First Presoyteman church, Trure, to Rev. James Falconer, of Newport, was accepted by that gentleman and sustained by the Presbytery. The translation will take place early in October.

The Rev. Dr. Grapt, Otillia, conducted the prayer meeting in the Presbyterian lecture room on sept. 2nd, having returned home the previous day. At the close of the regular service the Rev. He was educated at Queen's College, Kingston, and ordained to the ministry by the Presby-erry of Brockvuite. On the 29th of May, 1888, he was appointed paster of the Presbyterian church at Risho's Mills and East Uxford. He was transferred on the 14th of April, 1891, to the Presbytery of Ottawa, and appointed paster of the churches at ritzroy harbor and Torbolton. He leaves a wife and four children, two sons and two daughters to mourn his loss.

The ordination and designation of Rev. J. B. Cropper as missionary to Demerara took place in Fort Massey church, Tuesday, 8th. Rev. Mr. Diokie, of Windsor, conducted the opening services. Rev. Dr. Black preached from Cor. I. 2l. Rov. Dr. alterison then narrated the steps that had resumed in Mr. Cropper's appointment as missionary to Demerara. At the close of his address, Mr. I alconer in the name of the foreign board presented Mr. Cropper with a Bible. Dr. Gordon then addressed the people, sketching the chiracter of those to whom Mr. Cropper is commissioned to labor. A great work has been done among the Coolies in Irania and Mr. Cropper goes forth with every prospect of successiver on churches then continue to go forward. PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE.

Probytery met in Paisley on Tuesday, Sept. 8th. Rev. E. A. McKenzie, moderator. Elders' commission was recolved from Tiverton session appointing all George Ord to represent that congregation in Presbytery and Synod. He teling present took his seat. Mr. McQuarrie reported that the committee appointing commissioners to the General Assembly agreed to recommend the following schemes: That a permanent roll of the congregations within the bounds be kept and that ministers he appointed from the top of the roll in rotation, the Preslytery reserving the right to send members by ballot when it may so decide.
