4th Rule of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund: "Every Clergyman of the Church of England in the Diocese, wishing to avail himself of the benefits of this fund, shall, within six months from the 10th Oct. 1856, or within one year from taking orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secty for a Certificate of pension, and shall pay the annual sum or premium therefor, as hereafter mentioned."

The above limited time expires on the 10th of April, 1856.

5th Rule. "Any applicant after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive such Certificate at the option of the Sub. Com., and upon such terms as they shall direct."

The premiums for 1856 on Certificates already issued, are due on the 1st Jan'y, 1856. The last day on which such premiums can be received is Saturday, 9th Feb'y, 1856.

EXTENSIVE ROBBERY.

On Saturday night last, about the closing hour, one of the clerks in the establishment of Messrs. Boul, Anderson & Co., happening to look into the cellar where the coal is kept, noticed a roll of carpet stowed away in that unusual place, which he instantly made known to one of his employers. It was remarked that the colored servant, who was at the time putting up the shutters, on hearing the circumstances mentioned, became very much agitated and confused, so much so that his conduct at once excited suspicion that he was somehow concerned in the matter. Nothing, however, was said at the time, nor until Monday morning, when it was found that the carpet had been restored to its proper place. A warrant was then issued against the colored man, (whose name is Moses Johnston,) and he was at once arrested. The officers then proceeded to perform a search, and on repairing to the residence of the prisoner's mother, where he said he lived, several articles of value, the property of his employers, were discovered, when the officers obtained information that Johnston had private quarters of his own in another part of the city, and thither they at once directed their steps. On breaking open his door they beheld a sight at which they drew back in astonishment. A room furnished with rich and expensive carpets, window curtains, etc., etc., was literally crammed with articles of every description, and of the finest quality, which were at once identified by parties from the store who accompanied the officers, as the property of his employers. We saw the goods yesterday at the Police office, of which three or four clerks were "taking stock." There were costly handkerchiefs by the dozen, costly vest patterns, carpets, window curtains, and blinds of the finest linens; dozens upon dozens of silver handle knives and forks; dry goods of every description, the value of which it would be impossible to estimate. He must have stolen hundreds of pounds worth in all the time he has been in this employ.—Col.
