

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—The Heintzman Piano Co will build an extension to their factory, to cost \$15,000.

ST. BONIFACE, MAN.—C. O. Bertram invites tenders until noon of the 12th inst. for macadam pavement, stone curbing and boulevarding.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—The Council ask leave to pass a by-law to grant \$15,000 to aid W. J. and Harold E. Copp to erect a foundry.—F. E. ST. JOHN, N. B.—Edward Manning, secretary Board of School Trustees, will receive tenders up to 5 p. m. of the 14th inst. for the whole or part of issue of \$35,000 school debentures.—A number of plans have been received for the proposed Carnegie library and are being considered by the Council.—James Osburn, superintendent Atlantic Division C.P.R., states that a comprehensive plan has been prepared for dock improvements here, the estimated cost of which will be \$25,000,000.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—The county Council have appointed a committee consisting of Messrs. Gordon, Harness, Preston, McLean and others with the warden, to select a site and to have plans and specifications prepared for a House of Refuge.—The Council has appointed Messrs. McKinnon and Brown, and the warden and Mr. McArthur to look after the building of bridges on the town lines.—James Graig will erect a new residence.—Mr. G. O. Cameron has recently purchased a building lot.—Dr. Butt will build a residence.
