## ' Neverbink iodge.

I promised your some weeks ago to write a letter sbmut Nuversiok Lodge Kencels, Guymard, Orange County, N.Y., and their inmates. As I have been stayling there for some weeka I have had an oppor tualty to become well acquainted with all the doas Firat, howaver, a fow words about the Neversink Farm. The farm comprines about 450 acrea, of which about 800 are under cultivation. The house is on the top of a mall bill, and commands a beautluul view, hui that may be aud of almost any spot for some milasaround, for the acenery in every direction is almply too lovaly. The farm lies in a valley between two ramere of mpuatalns, and a few miles from the hown ace villay takee a turn to the loft. Just at this turs hist up on the mountain side, and thus commaíting a view in both directions, to the house of 0 . YYock, Req., brother.jn-law of the gonial proprictor of Merensink Lodge. Mr. P's house is about a mille or sofrom, $\mathbf{M}_{r}$, Gedofiroy's, there in a good road between the hounce, and aleo a telephone. There are gaod covers in every direction along the edges of the fields. and in nome places spreading over a large extent of ground. On both aldes of the stream the cover to very danse, and there wo plenty of Woodcock to be found there, in fact a great many of Mr. G's friends eay that it is one of the bent woodcock covers in America. Partridge too, are plentiful, and quail; the doar hatio bob-whitee are whinting in every direction, rabbite fairly swarm, while deer and bear are to be found within twenty miles;, but these of courne are of Noversink Farm, so they don't count. The atream is mocked with trout of good size and fair numbers. Ottern and foxes, wild cata, and othor vermin are killed in great numbers, and a few ducks come in to the posids in the streama. What a aportaman's paradine this is 1 and when you add to all that, a range of the same kind of country all around, the nlcest of quartores, and the kindest and most hospitsble of boeva, you oun form a slight idea of Neverinink Lodge. Mr. C. hat plenty of enterprise, he hat atocked his sesis whe qual, his stream with trout, has employed owe of the beat dog-breakers in Engiand, and last, but not least, has lately imported a lot of phearant oges from England, which he ser under domeatic heme, and leat Sunday there were some dozen or so of chleks out and more oxpected. Thurtle, the break er, alluded to shove, has had lots of experience in railing pheamanta in Ringiand, and he thinka that the cover is aplondidily miapted for them, and that they cught to be a decided success. Now for the kennela :
The buildinga ave very well adapted for their purpowe. As you enter the door you walk down a pas mage with etalls on either side. Theno stalls each have a yand attecobed, and at the end of the buydiling Io a roem in whick the cooking is done in wiam and dege art wathed, phyatcked, otc. In jammer the
cooking is done in an outhouse some distance from the kennels. The exercising yard is large and convenient, and the kennels are kept scrupulously clean, and $b_{f}$ the free use of disinfectants there is not the alightest amell perceptible. First in size and importance is the rough coated St. Beraard, Marco, import. ed from Prince bolms' Kennels. Marco is a grand dog in cont, form, color, \&c., and is a very jolly companion when his master is along. He does noi make frlends readily, but I succeeded in charming him, and we havs been the greatest of chums ever since. I will not try to enumerate the various doge' perform. ances, as it would take too muelu apace. Buffice it to say that they have nearly all taken prizes in England, Gormany, and America. Next to Marco comea his mate Braunfola, from the aame kennal, a noble bitch, with a head auch an is soldom seen except in pictures. Kindneat and Intelligence fairly beam from her eyes, and she is a univermal favorite. Her only fault is that her coat is hardly rough enough, but she is my beau-ideal of a large dog, so atrong and aymmetrical, with such a aweet temper.
Next comes Cheadle, bred by L. Z. Oollins, and presented to Madame Godeffroy by Rev. J. C. Mac. dons. Cheadie is a young dog, but gives promise of turning out very handsome. He is now 18 months old, and it is considered a shame that he was unnoticed at the N. Y. ahow.

Crozteth is his next neighbor, liver and white pointer dog, imported from Bir B. Garth's Kennels. Croc, as ho is called, is a large and strong dog, uniting beauty with great worting powers. Thurtle has him in perfect control, and 1 belinve be is goiag to run in the fied trials this fall. The great trouble with him is that he has an ulcerated tooth, which is so painful that sometimes he will not eat for days, and thus it is impoanible to get him into good show condition. 'l'o this, no doubt, he owed his dofeat last month, as for a week before the show, they had to force meat down his throat. Croxtoth is a dog of great merit, and will surely add to the renown of the kennele.
Champion Queen is next, a good uscful bitch, liver and white. She is now in whelp to Croxteth, and has thrown nome extra fine pupa by Champion Eensation. She hat takan quite a number of prizes as her " champion" implien. There are some vory fine pointer puppies aluo. One by Sensation - Queen, and a couple of youngsters by Croxteth, - Queen.
Ranger 11 (English setter) a son of Macdona's celebrated Ranger, is a dog that dewervee notice. In the field he is not worth much, as he is protty old now, but as a stud dog he is unsurpamed. Ho is lemon and white, with the long, low "Ranger " build, and is very faet, while his progeny areatill faster. Among thea are Nelly II (Ragger II -Nellie) owned by Mr. J. Grainger, a very pretty little butch, and a mare worker. She is entared for the trialm this fall, and her ownor is quite conadont of her succem. Daldy (Ranger II-Nollio II) a ton-month puppy, is a parfoct little wonder. Thurtio has tralned her in the
most perfect style, she is a lightning goer, and works like au old stager. She is entered for the Derliy. Decimal Dash and Silk are a beautiful pair of black and whites, both imported. I do not know about their acld qualities as I have never seen themat work, but for looks they are hard to beat, they both receiving awards at the late show. Belle. lemon and white, a Ranger II bitch, in very pretty. Sho bas not been brokon, and has now a fine litter of four pups by-Deciminal Dash.

Rover II (Irish) is a fine large dog, sired by Mac. dona's celebrated Rover. He hus got some very fine pups, out of the next one we came to, Moya, a very handsome impurted bitch, a fair worker, and n grand brood bitch. Moya has a few youngsters, four or Ave months old, and is now in whelp to Rover II. Biddy, (Irish) is, in my mind, the handsomest Irish eetter of the lot. She has a good deal of white on her breast and toes, but is a strong, well built, eetterlike bitch. Some extra fine pups are expected from her by Rover II. She in a late purchise and has not been bred yet.

We now come to the pride of the kennel, in my humble opinion, namely, cbampion "Beauty,".imported black and tan setter bitch. Her name is not half expresaive enough, I thiak. A coat like satin, bright tan markinga, a beautiful head and ears, tail well carried, legs and feet perfect, and eyes that seem to speak-that's Beauty! She is angood an the is beautiful, and is the stand-by of the kenvel for work. She has now a litter of flve puppies, by A.H. Moore's "Bob." Another little lady that thinks herself mistreat of the whole concern, is the liver and white cocker bitch "Flist," Madame G's special property, and the only one that has the run of the house. She swaggers about the house with her nose in the air, and the only thing that cas disturl her dignitied composure is to mention the word ball ! Then she goes into a perfect ft, and nothing will calm her but to get her ball and let her fectio it till she is tired. She has three very pretty pups by McKoon's "Captain," one of which "Pillicoddy" (called after a chameter in a farce lately rendered at Neversink Lodge) is a faithful little copy of Firt including the cheek. Flirt's great chum to a little fox terrier, Lady Gay Spanker, the property of Mr. Grainger. Gay is about perfect as a fol errier. She is 16 months old, and as noou as alhe in a little $o^{\circ}$ der, and more filled out, she is going to Angland to be shewn there. A very pretty collie pup, Lassie, completes the list, besides which, there are of course, numbers of pups unnamed, and with no record. These it would be imposible to describe, and I think I have gone through the kennels protty well. I find that I have in come cases deacribed the doga personal qualitiea more than their points, but when one gets to know dogs an well as I know these, it in diffioult to remember their points, and to pass over the qualitien which take the deepest hold on ones memory.
