throughout Quebec. The pan-québécoise event took place in Hull, and the Institute worked with the organizers in the design of a category of exhibits on science and peace.

A joint project with the Division of the University Extension and Community Relations of the University of Victoria resulted in the taping of a television show to be broadcast on the Knowledge Network in British Columbia, as well as a teaching guide for the programme, and a full-day workshop for the public. The subject involved many of the issues raised in *Peace in Our Time?*, the Director's Annual Statement of January 1990.

The Institute developed a joint project with the Canadian Bureau for International Education and helped organize seminars on Canada and the United Nations on three university campuses. The first seminar took place in March at Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia.

Schools, Teachers and Students

Institute staff continued to work with high school teachers and students. Through a joint project with the Council for Canadian Unity, the Institute contributes \$50,000 per year

towards the operation of the Terry Fox Centre. Each week during the academic year, the Centre brings to Ottawa 130 high school students from across Canada. A part of their programme is devoted to the study of issues of peace and security. CIIPS designed and continues to implement that section of the weekly schedule. During the winter of 1991, the programme was redesigned to focus on the war in the Persian Gulf, a subject of great interest to the students.

Institute personnel spoke at professional development days for high school teachers in Gander, Edmonton, Barrie, Stoney Creek, Ottawa, Alexandria, Cobourg, Toronto. They also led discussions amongst groups of students.

The Teachers' Handbook on Peace and Security was distributed widely in 1990–91. Separate inserts were developed for several provinces to illustrate how the Handbook can best be used in each provincial curriculum, and preparations continue for the translation, distribution and promotion of a Frenchlanguage version. Factsheets, short publications geared mainly for high school audiences, were published on the following topics: International Law and the World Court, La Francophonie, and The Commonwealth.

Exchanges

The Institute continued an exchange programme with the Institute for the USA and Canada in Moscow. Stephen Page of Queen's University, Edward McWhinney of British Columbia, Robert Boardman of Dalhousie University and Michael Bryans of CIIPS visited the Soviet Union during the year. We received Olga Shapyrina, Sergei Molotchkov, and Arkady Cherkasov. Each Soviet visitor
