LOCAL INITIATIVES PROGRAM—REQUEST FOR UNANIMOUS CONSENT TO MOVE MOTION

Mr. David Orlikow (Winnipeg North): Mr. Speaker, in the light of representations made to Members of Parliament of all parties from, I suppose, all the major cities in

this country I should like to move, under the provisions of Standing Order 43:

That the Minister of Manpower and Immigration be requested to review the criteria adopted for the continuation of LIP grants so that projects which have been discontinued solely because the cities in which they operate have a lower rate of unemployment than the national average can be considered favourably: (a) because the area in which they operate has a high rate of unemployment, (b) because the project itself is of great social value.

REPORTED NUTRITIONAL DEFICIENCY—REQUEST FOR UNANIMOUS CONSENT TO MOVE MOTION

Mr. J. R. Holmes (Lambton-Kent): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Standing Order 43 I rise on a matter of urgent and pressing necessity arising from recent reports indicating that a critical problem of nutritional deficiency exists throughout Canada, and from the failure of the federal government to develop an effective educational program for the prevention of nutritional deficiency problems.
