Mr. Tobin: Mr. Speaker, I have multiple petitions with regard to the Katimavik program from residents of the Province of Ontario. The first petition is from residents of the Ottawa region, the second from residents of the Ottawa and Toronto area, and the third is also from the Province of Ontario. They all protest, in large number and clear voice, the cancellation of Katimavik and ask the Government to restore it to its previous funding level.
