ISRAEL-PALESTINE SITUATION

Mr. Svend J. Robinson (Burnaby—Kingsway): Mr. Speaker, I rise to strongly condemn the recent violence and brutality of the Israeli army against unarmed Palestinian protesters, some on the site of the Al Aqsa mosque, Islam's third holiest shrine. While the stoning of Jewish worshippers at the Wailing Wall is of course wrong, the response of the army, using bullets against rocks, is an outrage and tragically, an all too familiar one. Over 150 children have died at the hands of the IDF since the start of the *intifada*. Israel has displayed contempt for international law and human rights by its policies of collective punishment, forced deportations and settlements.

Canada must strongly condemn these tragic killings, support the sending of a UN Security Council investigative team to the area and actively promote the early convening of an international peace conference on justice and self-determination for the Palestinians.
