Government May Have to Prohibit Free Entrance

The government states that circum The government states that circumstances have arisen that may necessitate the prohibition of free entrance to these ports. If the signal is up, the vessel must go to the examination anchorage. Patrolling vessels are also likely to be near, from which instructions can be obtained. Private signal must not be used nor boats lowered when the vessel is at anchor. Unless these instructions are strictly obeyed very serious consequences are liable to occur.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—A force of 200 Turks and Arabs, under German officers, who were preparing to attack the British station of Tor at the entrance to the Gulf of Suez, were attacked and either killed or taken prisoners Friday by a British force, according to a British official report from Cairo. One hundred soldiers were taken prisoners, and of the others it is believed that not one escaped death. The official report states that in January 50 Turks and two German officers approached Tor, believing that the place was undefended.
