OPEN DOOR IN CHINA POLICY OF BRITAIN

Sir Edward Grey Adheres to Principle of Equal Opportunities.

LONDON, April 20.—The preservation of the common interests of all the powers in China by the assurance of the independence and the integrity of the Chinese Republic and the principle of equal opportunities for the commerce and industry of all nations in China, these were declared by Sir Edward Grey, foreign secretary, to be the policy of the British Government in China.

Sir Edward in the British house of commons today was asked a number of questions concerning the negotiations now going on between China and Japan, but he replied that under the present conditions, while the negotiations were still proceeding, he was not able to make a detailed statement. Speaking generally, however, he declared that the policy of the British Government in China continued to be governed by the terms of the Anglo-Japanese agreement as defined above.

The foreign secretary added that the government was in close touch with diplomatic circles in China and Japan, and that the government was interested in the far east, and the house might rest assured that the government would endeavor to secure, to the best of its ability, an open door to British commerce in all parts of China.

HALT IN NEGOTIATIONS.

PEKING, April 20.—There was no conference today between representatives of China and Japan on the demands submitted by Tokyo to the Chinese republic the early part of this year. The belief prevails in the legation quarter and among Chinese officials that Japan is waiting to hear what Sir Edward Grey said today in the British house of commons.

After the Japanese demands became known in Washington the United States officially informed China that they expected China to maintain her treaty obligations with America, assuring the United States favored nation treatment.

POSTMEN ENLISTED SERVICE CRIPPLED

LONDON, April 20.—A marked result of the war through London at the present moment is the partial dislocation of the postal services. Mail deliveries are less frequent and hazardous collections are also fewer, and are confined to fixed times. A post-office official explained today that this was due to the fact that 30,000 postal servants are now under arms, the service being accordingly disorganized, and simply cannot get men over the military age to fill the places of the absentees. When we do get them it takes considerable time to train them, consequently the residue of the staff is struggling to carry on the work of those who have gone. We get occasional complaints regarding the late deliveries of letters, but it is useless complaining. We are just doing the best possible under extraordinary conditions.
