

*alone*, by filling all the departments of the Government with men not only attached to, and dependent upon, himself, but such as are so incapable of discharging the duties of their offices, that they are sure no other Minister would continue them, and therefore can have no hope of remaining but from supporting him; for should the King be displeased with Mr. Pitt, which of the other Ministers, they ask, could he send to supply his place for a day? so that Mr. Pitt, by his management, has reduced the King to the necessity of either continuing him *sole Minister*, or of making an entire and total change of his administration, a thing highly disagreeable and disgraceful to the Crown, and not to be done but from great necessity.

It is beside my purpose to examine or controvert the truth of either party's charge against the other; but the whole nation will make an exception in the last in favour of that great Atlas of the constitution, and ornament of the woofack, whose brilliant wit, vast comprehension, sound judgment, and inflexible integrity, give equal dignity and strength to the Crown, and security to the liberties and properties
