

the River Winnipeg, at a spot which has been named Islington.

The only one of the former stations in which any change has taken place, except that of progress, is La Ronge; from which, after two years of great privation and sufferings, Mr. and Mrs. Hunt have been compelled to remove, on account of the great difficulty in procuring provisions. They were, by the last accounts, establishing themselves at Green Point on English River; which will, we hope, prove a more favourable situation.

Mr. Cockran is residing at the Indian Village, and we can imagine the interest with which he must minister to a flock so peculiarly gathered in by himself. He has also the comfort of having his son in the ministry; he was ordained on June 6th, 1852. But on the other hand, Mr. James, who came to England on a visit in 1851, has hitherto been prevented by illness from returning, to his own great sorrow and that of his people at the Rapids.

All the missionaries at the new Stations speak very encouragingly of the prospects before them, but they still need our prayers that the Spirit of God may rest upon all, whether old or new, and that increasing numbers may be added to the Church daily of such as shall be saved.

* The Bishop has established three other new stations, two to the south-west of Red River, and one in Hudson's Bay; but as they are not in connexion with the Church Missionary Society, they are not specified here.
