Tobacco Growing on Large Scale

Planned for Emerald Isle.

It may not be so long before the "Irish perfecto" will be as familiar as the "clear Havana." Tobacco-growing is being developed with some rapidity in Ireland. It is about twenty years since Col. Nugent Talbot Everard commenced experimenting in growings tobacco on his estate at Randlestown, County Meath. Others have imitated him, and the result is that now, in addition to his twenty-five acres, there is Lord Barrymore with ten acres, Lord Dunraven with twenty-five acres, Capt. Otway Cuffe with seven acres, and many others with small plots. The total area under cultivation in Ireland is 120 acres, comprising 79 acres of pipe tobacco. 28 acres of cigaret and 13 acres of cigar tobacco. In Dublin a company employs sixty workmen and turns out pipe tobacco and cigares and igarets all made from the home-grown product. Tobacco was grown extensively at one time in the Emerald Isle for commercial purposes, but the iron heels of successive English rulers effectually stamped out the industry. GENERAL REYES WILL NOT TAKE HAND IN REVOLUTION

Expressed Opinion That Situation is Not Serious -- Frontier Reports Exaggerated.

PARIS, Nov. 25 .- General Bernardo Reyes, the Mexican soldier, who came to Paris some time ago on a mulitary mission for the Mexican Government, denied to-day the report that he intends to return to Mexico to take a hand in the revolution. To a representative of the Associated Press, Gen. Reyes expressed the opinion that President Diaz, who he described as a great patriot, would succeed in restoring order, and afterwards adopt effective measures for allaying the present popular discontent in Mexico. General Reyes declined to go into details regarding the causes which id up to the present condition of affairs in his country, but expressed the belief that the unrest could not be considered as serious, and would not last long.
