

With "three cheers and a tiger" for the King, the Ontario Legislature losed its legislative session at 7 o'clock last night. Sir James Whitney led the cheering. The afternoon was one of the most strenuous in the history of the assembly. The formal prorogation will be held on Friday afternoon.

Bilingual schools were discussed for a brief but spirited few minutes, when G. H. Ferguson (Con., Grenville), introduced an amendment to his original notice of motion, "That in the opinion of this house no language other than the English language, should be used as a medium of instruction in the schools of the province."

The amendment read: "That the English language shall be the language of instruction and communicaon of the pupils of the public and separate schools, except where, in the minion of the department of education is found impracticable because the upil does not understand English." A Familiar Controversy.

CITY'S POWER BILL GOES THRU.

Power was yesterday afternoon given the City of Toronto by the Ontario Legislature to ubmit the question of purchasing the Toronto Electric Light Company's, and the former Toronto Incandescent Light Company's rights and property to the electors, and to issue forty-year debentures to cover the cost, which, on the basis of \$125 a share, would be \$5,000,000.

Power was also given the city to establish a commission to have jurisdiction over the civic electrical department. One commissioner will be appointed by the Ontario Government, thru the Hydro-Electric Commission, one by the city council, and the mayor will be, ex-officio, the third member. The two first named will receive \$4000 a year.


