

ONLY TWO FAVORITES WINNERS AT COLUMBIA

Oakley, at 6 to 1, Beats Heavily-Backed Sea Swell—Yankee Bob, 10 to 1, First at Juarez.

Lichtenhein Says Montreal Ball Team One of Best in League

MONTREAL, Dec. 27.—When one or two more pitchers are secured for the Montreal Baseball Club, Mr. Lichtenhein thinks he will have the strongest aggregation that Montreal has ever had, and one of the strongest in the league. He will go to New York next Tuesday to see about more pitchers. He has already 28 players on the roster, which by April 18 next will have to be cut down to 25, as a new rule makes it compulsory that no team shall have more than 25 players on its list during the season.

Mr. Lichtenhein's list at present is as follows:
