TWENTY-THOUSAND PEOPLE SAW RACES AT THE WOODBINE

Royal Party Again Present and Scene on the Lawn Was 'Gorgeous'—Excitement Caused When One of the Duke's Horses Fell

Royal Canadian weather and twenty thousand people greeted the duke's party at the Woodbine yesterday. A gusty breeze from the northwest stirred the soft plumery of the ladies' hats and shimmered the silk of the ravishing costumes. The fashion display was the most beautiful ever seen at that meet of fashion, the races. Costumes that ranged from the very popular style, were witnessed in the enclosure of the favored members and their wives and their daughters and their guests. But the apparel of the favored feminine was closely emulated in many many instances by the costumes in the public stands and in the grandstand. And it was noticeable that there was not quite so much sombre black to offset the gay colors. The warm bright sunshine tempted the men to wear clothes of gray, lighter hues. The whole effect was one of scintillating brightness.

The breeze that raised the warm air bearably snuffed the flags and fluttering and help to give to the scene a look of jiggling, happy life. And even the lower—aid there were many, because it was an unlucky day for the favorites—were happy. The noisy good humor of the crowd was infectious. Even the most calm good churchover would have become incensed with the ardent ardor of the people and declared "No more racing for me."

Record Crowd

The course was slow for the first two or three races, but dried up considerably and making fast going for the later contests, although the south part of the track was so thoroughly saturated with the rain of the last few days that it was still rather muddy. But this gave only added zest to the betting. It made more difficult the always difficult task of making money away from the calm, mercenary machines.

MONOCACY AND PRISCILLIAN WIN THE HOLIDAY FEATURES

Four Favorites, a Second Choice and Two at Good Prices Prove the Winners

Enormous Crowd at the Woodbine Track.

The attendance at Woodbine Park yesterday afternoon was almost equal to the proportions of opening day. The weather was ideal, the track slow, and the royal gubernatorial party attended in force.

Four favorites scored, Scrimmage finishing second, Flying Yankee third, and Bravay outside the money. Elwah, in the opening event, and Supervisor in the sixth paid the largest odds to win. Monocacy, second choice, landed the Victoria Stakes, one of the features of the day, the Prince of Wales Handicap going to Priscillian, the favorite.

Miss Detroit showed the way in the opening event after the barrier sprang, chased by Elwah, Turner riding like a demon. Skeetsa Martin's filly soon had a lead that she made more at every stride, and finished galloping. Stalmore, second, six lengths in front of Flying Yankee, the favorite, third. The winner paid better than 6 to 1 to win.

Monocacy, from the Whitney stable, broke thru the barrier before the start of the Victoria Stakes, and this was a run that she never forgot. Priscillian started from the outside, and did not get into the race until the turn, and then she was in front with Idle Michael. Caugh Hill, second choice, came thru on the rail and followed the leader, coming home. Knights Differ came from the rack and raced with Senator Sullivan at the place, the honor going to Robert Davis.

Rye Straw shot out at the start of the sprints race, and had an open length in the stretch. The Lady Irma passed the leader on the home, making a nice race up the stretch, and a win by less than a length. Union Jack, second choice, took the show.

The steeplechase furnished a splendid spectacle, the four remaining together for two and one-half miles, alternating in the lead. Then Laomedon dropped out tired and beaten. Idle Michael and New Comer taking the last jump almost together, and the former winning by a length. Joe Lett pulled up third. The Seagram hunter threw his rider at the final fence.

Supervisor, at a good price, landed the sixth, that had an exciting finish, stretching, favorite, and effective from the back stretch. Supervisor drove up the stretch, and won by a neck or thereabouts.

Tropeolum won the Canadian-bred, driving even from the three-quarter mile chute to the wire. He was off near the outside, running, with Longus from the rail position the closest attendant. The latter dropped back in the stretch, when the Hamilton and London Platers came into prominence, and thus they finished. Tropeolum 1, Le Dor 2 and Phillis 3.
