





Out New Schedule. Guelph, Aug. 13.—The light and heat commission this morning had a lengthy discussion in connection with the power situation here which will require further attention in the fall when more energy is needed. It is the intention of the commission to adopt a schedule whereby 300 horsepower per hour will be cut off the present load and Manager Heeg was instructed to work out this schedule. In order to get the 300 horsepower the non-essential users of electricity will have their supply curtailed to some extent so that the full amount needed can be given to the essential factories.
