CORN BUYING FOR EXPORT REPORTED

Decrease in U. S. Visible Supply Total is Another Bullish Influence.

Chicago, Feb. 10.—Gossip that exporters were nibbling for corn helped to bring about a rally today in prices here. The market closed firm, 1-4 to 1-14 net higher with May \$1.12 3-4 to \$1.12 7-8, and July \$1.09 3-8 to \$1.09 1-2. Oats finished unchanged to 7-8c up, and provisions at an advance of 50 cents to \$1.

Nearly deliveries of corn displayed the most strength, and it was shown that exports from North America last week amounted to 418,000 bushels, as compared with 25,000 bushels the week previous. Fresh sales here of 50,000 bushels to export were also announced. Notice was taken too of a decrease of 555,000 bushels in the United States visible supply total. Besides, although receipts were somewhat larger than has been the rule of late, they were of far less volume than last year. Concurrent with these developments, there was a noticeable withdrawal of selling pressure which had depressed the market during the first part of the day, and which at the time was ascribed to favorable conditions for shipping and shipping, and to apparent absence of eastern demand. Oats merely paralleled the action of corn.

All provisions advanced to the day's maximum limit. Exports were on a huge scale, and there were higher quotations on hogs.

MINING NOTES

The report that negotiations were in progress for Dome Mines to secure control of Preston East Dome was denied by a Preston East Dome director when interviewed by The Northern Miner.

Crown Reserve's discovery in the eastern part of the property is standing up well under development. Raising is now well under way and for the 25 feet of raising results have equaled that of about 160 feet of drifting.

Shipments at the Foster have not been resumed as was generally expected. It was reported that the lessees intended building a mill on the property, but this has been denied by them. Some high grade ore has been extracted underground and it is likely that a small shipment will be made of it soon.

It is expected that the remodeled mill of the Provincial Cobalt will be in operation this week. It will run on lower grade material for a time, but the higher grade material from the mine will be run thru later. A long crosscut from the second shaft to enter the original workings has been completed. During the several hundred feet of crosscutting no new veins were found.

The Northern Miner says: Nipissing lost no time in actively getting to work on the Ophir. Before the deal was ratified by Ophir shareholders tracks were laid and several improvements in underground facilities made so that no delay would occur in getting the work started. Nipissing is working where the Mining Corporation left off. Work is being done on two faces along the contact.

A three-quarter interest has been sold in the Connell property in Boston Creek. The property lies adjacent to the Miller Independence on the east. It is stated the purchase price was made in full. Dayton interests are said to have made the purchase. Sinking operations on the Kirkland Township property are under way. The shaft is already down about 40 feet. The quartz vein is well mineralized at that depth, with considerable graphite occurring in the seams and along the walls.

After a temporary shutdown due to the power company's breakdown, the Genesee resumed operations again last week. The plant was given a thorough overhauling and the pumping system rearranged. This company is financed largely by Rochester capital.

BOND DEALINGS ACTIVE IN MONTREAL MARKET

Stock Fluctuations Are Narrow —Montreal Power Does Not Extend Gain.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—Bonds furnished a larger quota than stocks today on the Montreal exchange, with some large transactions in the 1923 and 1923 Victory issues, the chief feature. Bond business at a total of \$672,150 par value, established a new local record, and compared for the day with stock transactions of less than 3000 shares, exclusive of mining stocks. Despite the large aggregate of bond dealings, prices moved narrowly, holding in the main at the same level as at the week-end.

Stock fluctuations were also narrow, with the undertone of the market steady to firm. Montreal Power continued prominent, but failed to add to the substantial advance of last week.

The earlier stocks of the day included Steamship common, which closed 1-4 off at 45; Ames-Holden preferred, 11-2 lower at 73; and Asbestos common, which sold off 1-2 to 48 1-2. The only price changes in the bond list were an advance of 1-4, in the 1933 Victory issue, which sold at 101 3-8 in the final dealings, after ranging between 101 1-2 and 101 3-4, and a decline of 3-8 in the 1937 five per cent. War Loan which sold at 97 1-2.

Total business for the day: 2577 shares, 5030 mines, 205 rights, 680 unlisted shares, and 672,150 bonds.

HOME LAKE COMPANY HAS A BRIGHT OUTLOOK

Reports at Annual Meeting Show Considerable Ore in Sight

At the seventh annual meeting of shareholders of the Home Lake Mining Company, yesterday afternoon, the reports presented by the directors and by General Manager Sherrill and Resident Manager Randall were of optimistic character. The mine was operated continuously through the year, and at present drifting is proceeding both east and west on the No. 3 vein, at the 600-foot level. In both directions this work was described as developing excellent ore for the full width of the drift, that is to the west averaging \$17 to the ton, and that to the east over \$12.50 per ton. The mill produced continuously until the middle of December, when it was shut down, and a clean-up made. There were 11,229 tons milled, the value being \$97,341. The year's operations were conducted at a small loss, because of the abnormal costs, but the management expressed confidence that the year just begun will be a successful one. The company's indebtedness to the Hudson Bay Mining Company was paid off during the year by means
