MORE DON VALLEY MARVELS. | Caterpillars and Canoes Brought Out by a 56 Above Sun -Spring Mildness All Thru Middle and Eastern States-Cold Snap Due To-night.

The Valley of the Don was a natural marvel yesterday in more ways than one. The high lands and the valley flats steamed with mists all the day, and the sun shone gloriously thru the tree tops above.
