

NO MINTO CUP FOR TECUMSEHS CAPITALS WIN FIRST GAME, 4-1

Record Crowd Saw Game in Ideal Weather at Rosedale—It Was a Tie Till Near Close of the Third Quarter, When Clark Put Ball Thru His Own Goal.

The largest crowd (probably 7000) that ever witnessed a lacrosse match in Toronto turned out to Rosedale Saturday to see Caps and Tecumsehs play the first game for the championship of the N.L.U. and the Minto Cup.

The result was a disappointment to the spectators, for their hopes were beaten by a score of 4-1.

While the game was not as spectacular as last Saturday, it showed more close work. Both defenses were strong, and it eventually turned into a defensive game on both sides. Tecumsehs missed the ball in the first quarter that never occurred afterwards. They started some rushes that reminded you of a run on the Ontario Bank, but Boush handled the sphere out to them again.

Caps played a great defensive game, and with Ralph and Pringle directing the men, the game was almost impossible. Ralph at point was a tower of strength, followed closely by Pringle and Hutton, the latter playing one of the best games seen in Toronto in a long time. Caps deserved to win on the play, they being a better team, man for man. It was only the great defense work of Davidson, Hutton, Pickering and Picher that prevented a larger score. Tecumsehs seemed to be minus the field and altogether they played a poor game, save for last week. This was probably due to the loss of Querrie, who wrenched his knee in the second quarter, and toward the last they appeared to lose heart. However, it is doubtful on form displayed if the Tecumsehs would have beaten Toronto Saturday.

The officials, Carling and Pettigrew, didn't have much to do, but what little trouble they got into, they showed a keenness that resembled an evergreen.

Question of Provincial Subsidies
Only One Discussed—Power
Question Not Touched On.

Hon. J. J. Foy was the only minister who left Ottawa for Toronto on Saturday. Hon. Mr. Whitney went to Morrisburg and Hon. Mr. Matheson to Perth. Both are expected in the city this afternoon.

Mr. Foy said that the provincial subsidy question was the only one taken up by the premiers. The power question was not taken up, and the boundary question will be discussed at a conference of the premiers, November 10.

Premier Whitney had presented a memorandum of additional reasons why a larger sum than was demanded in the memorial of 1902 should be given Ontario. This memorandum may be published as soon as the premier returns. He did not get the assent of the other provinces to this proposal, and was not inclined to a hasty disposal of the matter in view of his complete lack of recent knowledge of the whole situation.
