

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

McDOUGAL AND THE STATUTE

WILL HE HAVE TO RESIGN?

Member for Ottawa Makes Protest in Legislature, But is Silent as to Partnership.

Is it possible that proceedings shall be taken to unseat D. J. McDougal, one of the members of the local house, for corrupt practices?

The question arises out of the situation described in yesterday's World, when Mr. McDougal, in the private bills committee, strongly supported the Ottawa City Bill, in which his partner, G. F. Henderson, was interested on behalf of "his clients," the Ottawa Electric Light Company. The statute is precise in regard to the matter. No barrister or solicitor, the partner of a member of the house, shall accept or receive, either directly or indirectly, any fee, compensation or reward for drafting, advising upon, promoting, or opposing any bill, resolution, matter or thing submitted or intended to be submitted to the consideration of the said assembly or of a committee thereof.

Any person wilfully violating the provisions of the act shall be subject to a penalty of \$500 over and above the amount or value of the fee, compensation or reward accepted or received by him, to be paid with full costs of action to anyone who will sue therefor, one-half to be paid to the person so suing, and the other half to the crown.

Mr. McDougal has been careful not to touch the question of partnership in his public utterances on the committee proceedings. It is to be presumed that his partner, Mr. Henderson, is not coming to Toronto to do business for his wealthy clients, but to do the thing, if, as a co-partner of Mr. McDougal, he is receiving fee or reward, Mr. McDougal either is, or is not, "knowingly accepting, or receiving, either directly or indirectly," a share of the fee. Any violation of this section, says section 10, following, shall be deemed a corrupt practice, and an election petition may be filed within six months. Should a violation be proved by the judge trying the petition, the seat of the member becomes vacated, and a writ shall issue for a new election, as if he were naturally dead, as the language of the act picturesquely phrases it.

Mr. McDougal is not alone in this. Just before the legislature adjourned yesterday afternoon, Mr. McDougal announced to the press his resignation and his surprise at what he had just read in The Evening News. The committee organ had worked up the previous day's report from the morning papers of the proceedings in the private bills committee when the hydro-electric power bill was almost thrown over by the Ottawa corporation in favor of the railway board as arbitrator. Should the bill be charged for electric service.

"What I object to in the article," Mr. McDougal informed the house, "is the intimation that certain members were unduly influenced for their votes in a committee of the house." He denied that any such thing had occurred, and related how one member had come and asked how to vote, when Mr. McDougal told him to stay in the committee room, and the arguments, and so on, as he thought right.

It was strange that there was any friction between the City of Ottawa and the Ottawa Electric Company, and he considered the whole charge "particularly reprehensible."

The new statute is remarkable about changing the control of the rates from one commission of the government to the other. If there were any bias in either, it was more likely to be in that composed of political partisans, two members of the government and one of the Conservative party. Surely, he thought, the one to be regarded with greater complacency by the country would be the non-partisan railway board.

Mr. McDougal in his remarks did not in any way allude to the question of partnership.

Premier Comforts.

Premier Whitney rose to say that Mr. McDougal had been as long in the house as himself, he would not take newspaper articles so seriously. He was quite right, however, in repudiating the suggestion which he thought unmerited. Premier Whitney had seen that week on three occasions headlines over a report bearing an intimation that which there was not one word of truth. Since Mr. McDougal had read the article, he had seen the premier desired to say that they were under a responsible government, and it was not expected that members of the committee should give their eyes to the government. Mr. McDougal would be commended intellectually for being so intelligent, but he would be commended for being so stupid.

He would, however, certainly have voted with the majority himself. The hydro-electric power commission was a part of the government, composed of two members of the government and one of the executive council, and the issue on this account should be settled by it.

Mr. McGarry vigorously repudiated the suggestion that he had been susceptible to any lobby influences. One of the solicitors had stated that he preferred the railway board, because he was related to one of the members of the hydro-electric power commission.

Business in the legislature was otherwise of a routine character. A number of bills were read a second time.

H. E. Preston (Brant) withdrew his question on the assurance of Premier Whitney that the railway board would report early in the week on the Con- necting clauses of the Municipal Act.

A Hislop moved for a return showing the amounts credited to the municipalities and the amounts charged against them for the maintenance of lunatics in connection with recent legislation. He thought the plan of division as now practiced worked disadvantageously to the smaller and poorer municipalities. It tended to encourage the sending of patients to the Houses of Refuge. He had expected a bill on the lines of the Pettipiece report and the sending of patients to the Houses of Refuge. A heavier tax should be levied on net earnings.

Matheson explained that the province could not raise earnings. The order was granted.

Young Montrealer Sentenced for Embezzling From Firm.

Montreal, March 8.—William J. McGee, the ex-secretary-treasurer of the People's Mutual Building Society, who pleaded guilty to the embezzlement of the society's funds and to charges of forgery in transferring shares of the society, was today sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary—five years for forgery and three years for theft.

In assigning for the benefit of his creditors, McGee, who is only thirty-three years of age, states his liabilities are \$101,000 and his assets about \$38,000.

Padding Public Accounts.

Ottawa, March 8.—In the public accounts committee today H. B. Ames, M.P., of Montreal, examined J. M. Courtney, C.M.G., ex-deputy minister of finance, in regard to the steps taken by the Dominion government to satisfy itself regarding the cost of the western division of the G.T.P., who bonds the country had undertaken to guarantee. He, however, was not able to shed much light on the matter.

A letter from Mr. Shannon, accountant of the railway department, was put in. It declared that the accounts of the G.T.P. included sums aggregating \$162,000, which, in his judgment, were not properly chargeable thereto. In other words, it was said to contain items that the department would not pay.
