

## TEN CANADIANS ARE IN IT

They Have Qualified to Compete in the Second Stage of the King's Prize Competition.

## SHOOT OVER FOR MACKINNON CUP

Scores of the Canadians in the Alexandra match—Mortimer is a Great Marksman.

Bisley Camp, July 23.—(Evening Telegram cable.)—To-day the principal matches in which the Canadians participated at the range, were the Alexandra and the Martin Challenge Cup.

The Martin Cup is a rapid firing competition. There is only one range, that at two hundred yards, and each contestant, in firing his seven shots, has either to sit or kneel. A time limit of one minute is placed, and magazines must be used.

Lance-Corporal Mortimer, who has been shooting splendidly, got his shots within the centre of the target every time in the Handsworth competition, which opened on Monday. The distance is 800 yards with 10 shots. Mortimer's marksmanship yesterday at the several ranges in the Kynoch Cup competition, took him to the top of the Canadian list. His big score, the highest individual tally in the contest, placed his fellow-countrymen immensely.

There are ten men from Canada, eleven from Australia, six from New Zealand, two from Natal, one from the West Indies, one from India, and three from Rhodesia, left to compete in the second stage of the King's Prize competition, which takes place on Friday.

With ten shots at the one thousand yard range, Sergt. Skedden of Hamilton made 45 points in the Kynoch match, which is being shot this week.

Pte. W. E. Bennett is one of the contestants in the Association Cup match; at 200 yards his score was 39, and at 600 yards, 38, out of a possible 40 at each range.

Sergt. T. G. Bayles, in the Ladies' match, distance 600 yards, with eight shots, made a score of 39 out of a possible 40.

The Mackinnon Cup competition, over which differences occurred last week on account of an overtime allowance to Scotland, will take place on Monday next.

In the Ely revolver competition, with stationary target at about 20 yards, Capt. Margaret made 40 points. At the vanishing target his score was 37 and at right and left 70.

## BRITAIN IS CONSIDERING.

Its Attitude Regarding an International Trust Conference.

London, July 23.—Replying to a question in the House of Commons to-day, the Premier, A. J. Balfour, said that the Imperial government was still considering its reply to Russia's suggestion regarding an International Trust Conference, but it was impossible, as yet, to announce Great Britain's attitude on the subject. As announced a despatch to the Associated Press, from London, July 18, Baron De Sael, the Russian Ambassador to Great Britain, about ten days previously, presented to the British government a note from M. Witte, the Russian Minister of Finance, also sent to all other powers which signed the Brussels Sugar Convention, proposing that these powers should consider in common means to protect international commerce against the artificial depression of prices, not only by government measures, such as export bounties or the tariff, but also by the much more dangerous processes adopted by trusts, private undertakings or cartels, which tend artificially to influence the international market.

## OVERLAND WIRELESS SYSTEM.

Now in Contemplation Between Chicago and Nova Scotia.

Chicago, July 23.—Within two months Chicago may be in direct communication with the coast of Nova Scotia by a system of wireless telegraphy. Options on two sites for the proposed station of the new system have been secured near Evanston by the agent of a Wireless Telegraph Company, and within six weeks it is expected the system will be installed. The agent last night for New York to submit the site to the promoters of the project. As soon as the plant is installed, tests will be made by the inventor of the system, and it is hoped that communication will be established with the station at Glace Bay, N. S. Doubtless, the project will be a success, and it is hoped that the ocean-going steamers.

## TENDERS FOR FAST LINE.

London, July 23.—Some tenders have been submitted for a fast Atlantic steamship line based on a subsidy of a million and a half. Shipowners say they know parliament would ratify such a proposal. The exact date of the C. P. R. is recognized and will be considered when all the tenders are received. It is hoped that the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Grand Trunk Railway will unite in making the project a success.

## TO AID STRIKING MINERS.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 23.—Secretary Wilson of the United Mine Workers received a cheque for \$50,000 to-day for the strike fund from the Illinois organization. This was forwarded by him immediately to the anthracite field. Within four weeks the Illinois miners have given the national organization \$100,000 for strike funds. They still have nearly half a million in reserve. This donation, it is said, is the largest ever received for a strike.

## MURDERED BY LADRONES.

Washington, July 23.—The War Department today received the following cablegram regarding Cuban teachers who have been missing from Cuba since June 10: "John E. Wells, Providence, R. I., and his cousin, Louis A. Thomas, Ernest Hager, Cincinnati, Ohio; A. France, Berea, Ohio, missing Cuban teachers, murdered by bandits, bodies recovered. Leader of murderers killed. Eight others captured by the constabulary."

## BIG STEEL COMPANY.

Pittsburg, July 23.—Jones & Laughlin's, the largest steel company outside of the United States Steel Company, has been reorganized at a meeting held here to-day. The capital stock will be increased from \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

## THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE.

London, July 23.—Absolutely nothing definite has resulted from the Imperial Conference. There has merely been a general discussion. No resolutions have been formulated. Britain is retained in regard to preferential duties and steamship subsidies.

## DIED AT NINETY.

St. John, N. B., July 23.—Thomas McClellan, one of the oldest and ablest of the Maritime provinces, died at the latter's home, Riverside, Albert County, yesterday.
