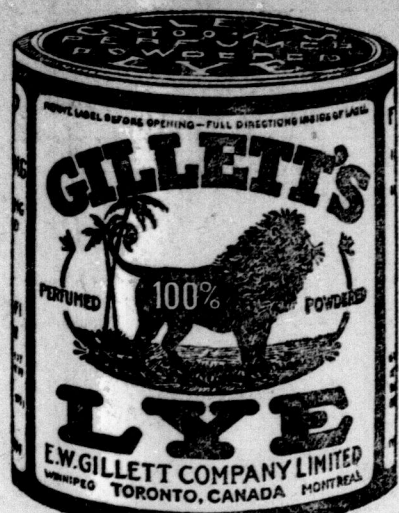




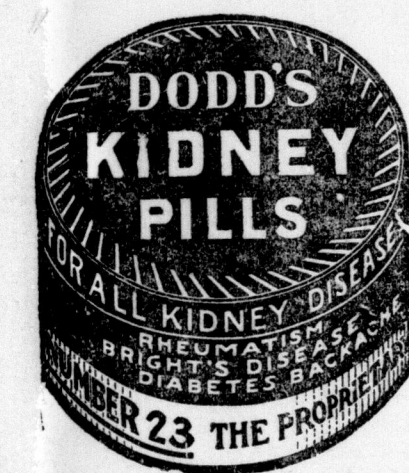
AUSTRIA WILL LIKELY ACCEPT PEACE TREATY

WOULD RATIFY PEACE TREATY AS IT STANDS

League To Enforce Peace Unalterably Opposed To Reservations.

OPINION IS UNANIMOUS

Would Not Have Amendment Which Might Jeopardize Complete Ratification.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Following publication of certain interpretations in the senate acceptance of the peace treaty suggested by Will H. Hayes, Republican national chairman, by former President Taft officials of the league to enforce peace, of which Mr. Taft is head, tonight issued a statement declaring that the league and Mr. Taft as well, have been and now are in favor of ratifying the treaty as it stands without reservation or amendments.

"At a meeting of the emergency campaign committee of the league to enforce peace, held in New York on Tuesday morning, at which members of the executive committee were also present, the question of amendments and reservations came up for discussion, and it was the unanimous opinion that the league should not suggest any reservations or amendments whatever," the statement continued. "The league understands that Mr. Taft shares this opinion, but that he, having in view a declaration that would not affect the validity of the ratification, made certain suggestions on the subject for possible future use by the friends of the league of nations and in the interest of ratification of the covenant."

Eight Hundred Natives Killed In Egypt Riots

General Allenby's Report on Disturbances Presented To Commons.

LONDON, July 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Eight hundred natives were killed and 1,600 wounded during the recent disturbances in Egypt, according to dispatches from Gen. Allenby, Cecil Harmsworth, under-secretary of the foreign office, made this announcement in the House of Commons tonight. The casualties to European and other civilians were: Killed 31, wounded 35. The casualties to the military were: Killed 23, wounded 114. The death sentence was imposed on 39 natives; detention for life 27. Upwards of 2,000 were sentenced to short terms of imprisonment. The military courts have been disengaged with the sentence which they imposed being reduced to three months.

SAYS WINDSOR IS CENTRE OF BIG DOPE RING

U. S. Internal Revenue Inspector Says He Has Actual Proof of Smuggling.

MAYOR TO INVESTIGATE

Will Co-operate With Detroit Officials in Clean-Up Campaign.

WINDSOR, July 24.—Addressing the Windsor Chamber of Commerce this afternoon James Brady, of Detroit, United States internal revenue inspector, claimed that he has absolute proof that over 90 per cent of the drugs used to satisfy the cravings of the 40,000 dope fiends in the city of Detroit was imported from Windsor. He alleged that there is a powerful ring of drug smugglers in Windsor with a Chinese café proprietor as chief. He urged that the Windsor police seize every such proprietor and lock them up while their premises were searched. "Do that and you will find barrels of the dope beneath the floors of their cellars," he said.

Further, Mr. Brady claimed that he could point out a number of places in the business section of the city where women regularly slip in and are given a hypodermic injection. In other places he alleges opium is regularly smoked. After hearing Mr. Brady's allegations, Mayor Winter informed Mr. Brady that the Windsor police department would welcome his co-operation in a clean-up campaign he will inaugurate at once. For some time past it has been known to the police that there was a ring, operating between Windsor and Detroit, but they had no idea it was of the gigantic proportions claimed by the American revenue officer.

RIVER CLAIMS THREE VICTIMS AT OWEN SOUND

Sisters Drowned While Bathing in River on Father's Farm.

OWEN SOUND, July 24.—A terrible tragedy occurred here today when three little girls, Fern, Hattie and Pearl Frazer, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Frazer, who reside on the west side of the Genesee road, were drowned in the Sydenham River. The children left home about 12:30 to bathe in the river at the back of their farm, where they were in the habit of going and where the water is quite shallow. No anxiety was felt when they failed to appear at 4 o'clock, but later the mother started in search of them and on the next farm found the clothes belonging to the two elder girls. She gave the alarm and after a search the bodies were finally located and brought into shore by Noble Poast, a boy of 15. He located the body of the second eldest

Hull Votes For Beer and Wine; Big Majority

Provincial Government Will Be Asked To Issue Licenses Immediately.

HULL, Quebec, July 24.—After a year in the "dry" column, through a local option vote, the city of Hull has voted to come under the beer and wine regulations of the province of Quebec. The voting, which began on Monday and ended tonight, resulted in 516 for and 183 against beer and wine. The Provincial Government will be asked to allow the issue of beer and wine licenses at once, although under the local option bylaws none could be issued before May 1, 1920.

Senator Asks For Treaty Between U.S. and France

Senate Declines Immediate Consideration of Resolution Asking Wilson To Submit It.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—A resolution requesting President Wilson to submit to the Senate the treaty by which the United States would promise to aid France in the event of an unprovoked attack by Germany, was offered in the Senate today by Chairman Lodge of the foreign relations committee. Unanimous consent for its immediate consideration was refused by Senator Robinson (Democrat), Arkans.

Senator Lodge offered the measure after a sharp debate during which Republican spokesmen declared that the terms of the treaty required that it be submitted to the Senate for ratification at the same time as the treaty with Germany.

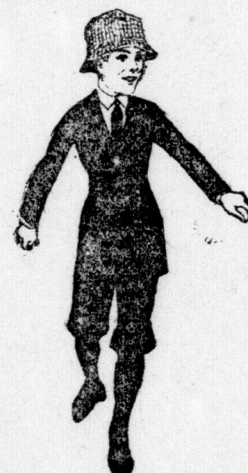
