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## ONTARIO'S EXPORTS OF APPLES WILL SHOW A LARGE INCREASE

Expected That the Quantity Packed Will Be Same As Last Year.

The fruit commissioners branch of the department of agriculture, Ottawa, has issued the following report:  
As the market for apples in the United Kingdom determines to a great extent the values in Canada and the United States, and as the English apple crop is also an important factor, a comparison of conditions obtaining this year with last is of interest. The English apple crop last year was one of the largest for many years, and the marketing period continued well into the new year. This year conditions are quite the reverse, and it is expected that the crop will be practically all disposed of by the middle of November. The removal of all restrictions on the purchase and sale of apples until November 15 will be a further incentive to dispose of the fruit within that period.  
Expect Good Crop.  
The commercial crop in Canada this year, having due regard to the increase in Ontario, now indicates a decrease of approximately one-quarter of a million barrels, but the quality is decidedly better, and as the supply of barrels and other packages used for shipping apples has improved during the past three weeks, and should this improvement continue, it is expected that the quantity packed will not be very far short of last year.  
In British Columbia the crop is now estimated at from 50 to 55 per cent of 1919, and as rapid strides have been made during the past few years in extending the markets of this province, it is expected the crop will again be widely distributed this year.  
Ontario's exports to the United Kingdom this season will undoubtedly show a substantial increase over the 1919-20 season, which was one of the lowest on record. This together with the established markets in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Ontario and the western part of Quebec, should absorb the balance of the crop at satisfactory prices.  
Quebec will have about 50 per cent of a normal crop, which is a considerable increase over 1919, but this province has for many years found a market at home, and it is not expected that much, if any, of the crop will be exported from the province this year.  
Will Be Small.  
The exportable surplus from New Brunswick will be small, and on account of the demand which has been created for the fruit from this province in Montreal, the greater portion will in all probability be shipped there.  
Prince Edward Island annually exports a small quantity to Newfoundland, but imports a considerable quantity, usually from Nova Scotia. The crop this year is estimated at from 20 to 25 per cent less than 1919.  
In Nova Scotia the commercial estimate continues at 900,000 barrels, as compared with 1,600,000 last year, of which 475,000 were exported to the United Kingdom and 153,864 to the United States.  
With a large crop in the Mississippi and Ohio valleys and in Western New York it is not expected that the United States markets will be attractive to Nova Scotia this year. Another factor in the distribution of the Nova Scotia crop is the increased production in Ontario and Quebec, the markets of which will be supplied to a great extent from the crop produced in these provinces. It would, therefore, appear that the export market, because of the advantageous situation with regard to inland freight charges, will be most attractive to Nova Scotia.  
The estimate of the commercial crop of the United States is now placed at 33,900,000 barrels, which shows an increase of 3,666,000 barrels over the estimate given by the Bureau of D. C. in the July forecast. This increase with an adequate supply of packages would undoubtedly be a very important factor in the export markets, but the apple barrel situation, and in fact all apple packages, has reached such an acute stage that it is feared it will greatly reduce the quantity for export.

## BRITAIN WANTS CANADA APPLES

British People Hungry For the Fruit and Willing To Pay For It.

Writing to The Advertiser from London, England, regarding the market for Ontario fruit, G. C. Creelman, agent-general for the province, says:  
"I have just been to Covent Garden Market and have interviewed some of the big fruit dealers there. They say that this country will have to rely upon imported fruit next winter and spring. This means that there will be a good market here for all kinds of orchard products this fall. In England only about one apple tree in ten has a crop of any kind, and what little there is of a very inferior grade. The information given out from the Government offices is that 5 per cent of last year's crop is a fair estimate.  
Only Fair Crop.  
"The reports from France are for a fair crop of apples, but recent severe storms have badly injured the prospects in some sections. Holland and Belgium expect a 50 per cent crop; Portugal and Spain well below the average.  
"The maximum fixed price in Great Britain for some time has been 9d (18 cents) a pound, retail. Today this has been lifted, and there will be no control of prices of apples until the 15th of November. On that date 10d (20 cents) a pound will be the fixed price for some time.  
Fixed the Price.  
"The Government has also fixed the maximum price which British buyers may pay for Ontario apples, viz.:  
"Sixty-eight shillings (\$14.40) per barrel of not less than 120 pounds.  
"Twenty-one shillings and sixpence (\$5.16) per box of not less than 27 pounds.  
"Twenty-three shillings and sixpence (\$5.64) per box of not less than 40 pounds.  
"Sixty shillings (\$12.00) per hundred-weight for all other packages.  
"I would advise that farmers secure their barrels, boxes, etc., now, and get ready for the fall picking and packing.  
"The buyers should also see that no orchards are overlooked and that no fruit is allowed to rot on the ground.  
Hungry for Apples.  
"It is with the hope of markets like this that the Ontario fruit grower plants and has since cared for his orchard. It will be a pity if he does not reap the benefit of it now. The people of Britain are hungry for apples, and are willing and able to pay for them.  
"It is not necessary to warn the shippers of the scarcity of space on ocean vessels. The situation is improving, but application must still be made early for accommodation at the Atlantic seaboard."

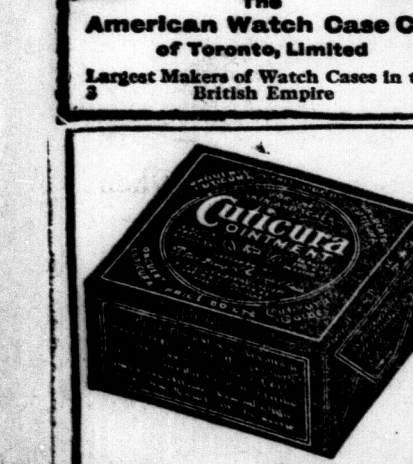
