

#### 8,000,000 BRITISH **WORKERS INSURED UNDER NEW ACT**

Insurance Against Unemployment.

BUDAPEST, Dec. 9 .- The question who will eventually occupy the throne of Hungary, has been a constant source of unrest and trouble, threatening a sudden upheaval of the recently-

attained peace and order. The pro-Hapsburgs declare that the former Emperor Charles is the real king of Hungary, and that no one else can legally aspire to the throne until he abdicates. The Independent Magyars, including large masses of the rural population, declare they will never surrender their recently-won independ-

"The Hapsburg will never give up their former countries," said Kovacs. "I am reliably informed that former Emperor Charles insists on first entering Vienna, and thence marching in triumph to Budapest. But the Magyars will never again acquiesce in losing their deady-paid independence."

Kovacs expresses the opinion of large masses of the rural population.

Prince Louis Windischgraetz, a personal friend of the Emperor, contested successfully for a seat in the National Assembly of Hungary and might contribute materially in helping to victory the case of his friend and former sovereign. He told the Associated Press correspondent:

"There can be no doubt about the claims of Charles. He is the crowned king of Hungary and until he resigns or arrives at some agreement with the nation, any attempt to dethrone him is an overt act of revolution.

"Hungary," the prince continued, "is now dependent on the help of one of the not strongly opposed to the return of the Hapsburgs, the more so, because it is an essential condition of maintaining permanent order in Eastern Europe. Besides, the restoration of the dynasty is

not explicitly vetoed by the treaty of Yeuilly.

"Charles, as a man, is the ideal ruler. He is entirely democratic, and a reformer, and although the caluminations
of his enemies spared neither his person nor his family, I am convinced that

"The talk of the claims of the Wittelsbach dynasty is mere nonsense; even the Hapsburg dynasty is blamed for not being sufficiently Magyar. Nobody can possibly think of electing a totally foreign king and dynasty.

"One thing is certain," concluded the prince, "we shall never indulge in plots, and if Charles is ever to return to Hungary, he will come back openly, and not in cowardly secrecy."

**BOLSHEVIKI EXPERTS** RESORT TO WAR-TIME METHODS OF PRINTING

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 9.—Bolshevik propaganda experts, anxious to avoid discovery of the propaganda matter they are taking to America, are said to have resorted to the old war-time dodge of having their printed matter done in microscopic form, capable of being enlarged photographically.

One man, who was caught in Central Europe, had in his possession a number of queer-looking postage stamps upon which were printed Soviet propaganda matter. The authorities were able to enlarge this to ordinary size.

The propaganda university which has been established at Moscow is reported to be now devoting extraordinary care to literature intended for two particular classes—women and farmers.

The women are urged to join the International Women's Communist Associations of which branches are to be established in America, and the latter are urged to form farmers' communes with the ultimate purpose of creating "Farmers' Red Guards."
