

OTTAWAS FINED \$500 TY COBB BANQUETTED FOR LEAVING ICE BY DETROIT ADMIRERS

Will Refuse To Play Unless Order Rescinded.

Montreal, Feb. 1.-At the special afternoon, it was unanimously decided Cobb paid the city his first visit since to fine the Ottawa hockey club \$500 as his appointment as manager of the punishment for the team's action Tigers. when it left the ice last Wednesday night in the game with the Canadiens

Ottawa supporters, discussing the decision unofficially, stated that the Ottawa team will refuse to play until the order is rescinded.
