## OTTAWAS FINED \$500 FOR LEAVING ICE BY DETROIT ADMIRERS

Ottawa Supporters Say Team Will Refuse To Play Unless Order Rescinded.

Montreal, Feb. 1.—At the special meeting of the National Hockey League, held in the Windsor Hotel here this afternoon, it was unanimously decided to fine the Ottawa hockey club \$500 as a punishment for the team's action when it left the ice last Wednesday night in the game with the Canadiens here.

Ottawa supporters, discussing the decision unofficially, stated that the Ottawa team will refuse to play until the order is rescinded.

The Ottawa must hand in their check for \$500 before their game in Ottawa tomorrow night, and must pay the balance within two weeks. The team will stand as a win for the Canadiens.

Geo. Kennedy, manager of the Canadiens, moved that he be further given a percentage of the receipts for the return match with Ottawa at the capital on February 12, but this was disallowed.

Are Sorry.

The Ottawa club in its defence, after a severe scoring by President Calder, declared that the players did not leave the ice, and made no effort to do so until Referee Cooper Smeaton had sounded the gong making the game forfeit to the Canadiens. Ottawa delegates, however, did not dispute Referee Smeaton's statement that they had stopped playing after he had awarded the goal in dispute to the Canadiens. They expressed regret at the incident. Hamilton claimed, Cully Wilson by reason of a deal with St. Patrick's, but this was refuted by the Toronto representatives, who said Wilson had been loaned to Canadiens for the balance of the season. Ottawa's efforts to have Harry Broadbent reinstated were again frustrated by a vote of 3 to 1.

## TY COBB BANQUETED BY DETROIT ADMIRERS

Famous Player's Selection as Club's Manager a Popular One.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 2.—Detroit baseball enthusiasts acclaimed an old star as a new leader yesterday, when Ty Cobb paid the city his first visit since his appointment as manager of the Tigers.

A full day of ceremony marked his welcome and convinced him that his selection to head the team was a popular one, and that the city was behind the club.

Cobb's characteristic comment, after he had been given the keys to the city, fated at various clubs, and banqueted last night was: "They like me now, but what will they say at the end of the season?"

Last night's banquet, attended by nearly 900 admirers of the famous player, was the feature of the day's program. The speakers included: the president of the American League, President Frank Navin of the local club; Hugh Bennett, former manager of the Tigers; Governor Alex. J. Groesbeck; Detroit publishers, and other men prominent in sports affairs and public life.

Judge Kenesaw M. Landis, baseball commissioner, who was to have attended the banquet, was unable to leave his duties on the bench in Chicago.

Speeches were reminiscent of the early days of the game, and filled with predictions for the continued popularity and success of the sport under the recently effected reorganization.

## WANT WIDER POWERS.

This action will prove a serious inconvenience to Bridgeport and Kitchener residents. The people of Bridgeport immediately started circulation of a petition, asking the Provincial Legislature to enact legislation permitting the Waterloo-Wellington Railway to collect a ten-cent fare between Bridgeport and Kitchener.

# SEVERAL CHANGES IN PARLIAMENT SEATING

McLean To Return To Liberals—Buchanan Likely To Leave Tories.

OTTAWA, Feb. 1.—Whatever may be the ultimate intentions of Hon. N. W. Rowell, M.P. for Durham, who, it has been rumored, contemplates resigning, he will be present at the reopening of parliament.

Several changes in the seating arrangements are in contemplation. Hon. A. K. MacLean, former minister without portfolio, is returning to his old faith, and will find a seat with the Liberals. L. P. Gauthier, M.P. for St. Hyacinthe, who is charged by the Liberals with flirting with the Government, will be requested to find a place to the right of the speaker.

W. A. Buchanan of Lethbridge will, it is anticipated, break definitely from the Government and find a seat in No Man's Land between the farmer's group and the Liberals. With him may go Fred Davis of Keewauqua.

To the farmer's group will be added C. C. McDermid, the victor in East Elgin, and to the Government side J. McKelvie, the new member for Yale. Just who will come from West Peterboro is yet a matter for speculation.
