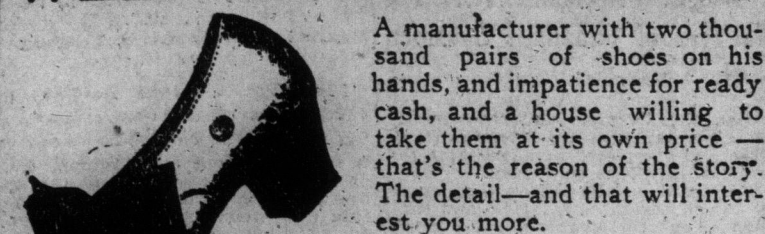

## REBELLION AT SUMATRA.

Women and Children Are Fleeing for Their Lives.

THE HAGUE, June 23.—A rebellion broke out at Padang on the west coast of Sumatra, which has reached alarming proportions. According to telegrams from Batavia, Java, almost the whole native population is reported to have risen under the leadership of fanatical priests.

There are thirty European settlements, which are spread over a wide area, and only 200 Dutch soldiers available to defend them. Three battles have been fought, resulting in considerable loss on both sides.

Preparations are being made to embark all the Dutch women and children from the west coast of Sumatra to places of safety. The dissatisfaction arose over the tax regulations.

LISBON, June 23.—News has been received here of a serious state of affairs in Portuguese Guinea. The natives everywhere are reported to be in revolt.

Anxiety is felt for Europeans who have been captured, as the natives are cannibals.

After a recent engagement the troops observed the natives devouring one of their own dead like a pack of wolves.

## Royalty at Wedding.

LONDON, June 23.—With King Edward and Queen Alexandra smiling approval from their private gallery, Jean Reid, daughter of Whitelaw Reid, United States ambassador to Great Britain, was married this afternoon in the Chapel Royal of St. James Palace, to the Hon. John Hubert Ward, brother of the Earl of Dudley, esquire in waiting to the King.

The bride's dress was of soft white satin trimmed with old rose point lace given her by her grandmother. The front of the skirt and waist were practically covered with this lace, which was caught up with tiny white rosettes and orange blossoms. The court train was of the same material as the dress, and like it, was trimmed with rose point lace. The veil, too, had a lace centre and edging, and was held by a wreath of orange blossoms. The bride wore but three pieces of jewelry, and these all were old-fashioned brooches, the wedding presents of King Edward, Queen Alexandra and Miss Ward.

Miss Jennie Crocker of San Francisco, a cousin of the bride, attended her and was the only bridesmaid. There were also in attendance five little children, two boys and three girls, all in quaint costumes of blue and white.

## Kindergarten Teaching.

A Burnhamthorpe subscriber is informed that according to Inspector Hughes, while kindergarten workers are needed in the schools, at the time there are no vacancies at present. He cannot speak about the demand in a nursery way, but kindergarten teachers can get their training in Toronto, the first year in a public school and the next in the Normal school. No fees are charged for tuition, but books and board required will, of course, be at the students' expense. To qualify one must have had a three-year course in a high school or have passed the lower form examination.

## "Jack" Churchill Engaged.

LONDON, Eng., June 23.—"Jack" Churchill's engagement to Lady Gwendolyn Bertie, daughter of the Earl of Abingdon, was reported in the fact, ignored by many people, that Winston Churchill, the president of the board of trade, is the brother of the minister of commerce in the Asquith cabinet, has a younger brother, whose name is also Winston, but who is seldom heard of in the newspapers, and moves about just as unobtrusively in society as his elder brother coronates.

Winston the statesman rejoices in the Christian name of Winston Spencer, while his brother is John Strange Winston Churchill and is popularly known as "Jack." He is with his mother, Mrs. George Cornwallis West, is on the most intimate and friendly terms with the latter's husband, who is only a year or so older than himself, and is associated with his stepfather in a stock brokerage business in London.

Neither of them takes much interest in politics, being absorbed in their business, and devoting what leisure they can to boating and horseriding. They absolutely despise to take seriously Winston's pretensions to statesmanship, and regard his presence in the cabinet as a significant joke, ministerial office in their eyes merely qualifying him as a butt for all sorts of fun and pranks, which, it must be confessed, he takes very good nature.

"Jack," like Winston, went through the Boer war, bearing himself gallantly; but, whereas Winston was in the G. M. line, "Jack" is now twenty-eight, was little heard of, and was not in the line of the illustrated papers representing the then Lady Randolph Churchill in the G. M. line. The Duke of Marlborough, a landed magnate of Gloucestershire, their son was Sir Winston Churchill, and it was Sir Winston's son who was the first Duke of Marlborough. The name of Winston has thus been passed on to the third generation.

Mrs. George Cornwallis West is by no means badly off, and the fact, therefore, that business on the stock exchange has been rather dull of late, and that Lady "Gunny" Bertie has no money of her own, and belongs to an impoverished family, is not of vital importance. Mrs. George Cornwallis West derives a handsome income from the rents of the building now occupied by the Manhattan Club of New York, which she inherited from her father, Leonard Jerome, and has, moreover, increased her fortune by speculation. Nor did she forfeit any of the fortune left to her by Lord Randolph Churchill through her second marriage. All his pictures and books bequeathed to her absolutely, and gave her besides an inalienable life interest in the \$500,000 which constituted his fortune, and which included a little country seat in Oxfordshire, bequeathed to him only a few weeks before his death by a maiden lady whom he had never met. "In recognition of his commanding political genius," this fortune of \$500,000 left by Lord Randolph passed on her death, but not until then, to her two sons, in such part as she may determine, that is to say, if her eldest son displeases her she is at perfect liberty to bequeath two-thirds, or even three-quarters, of the property to her younger boy.

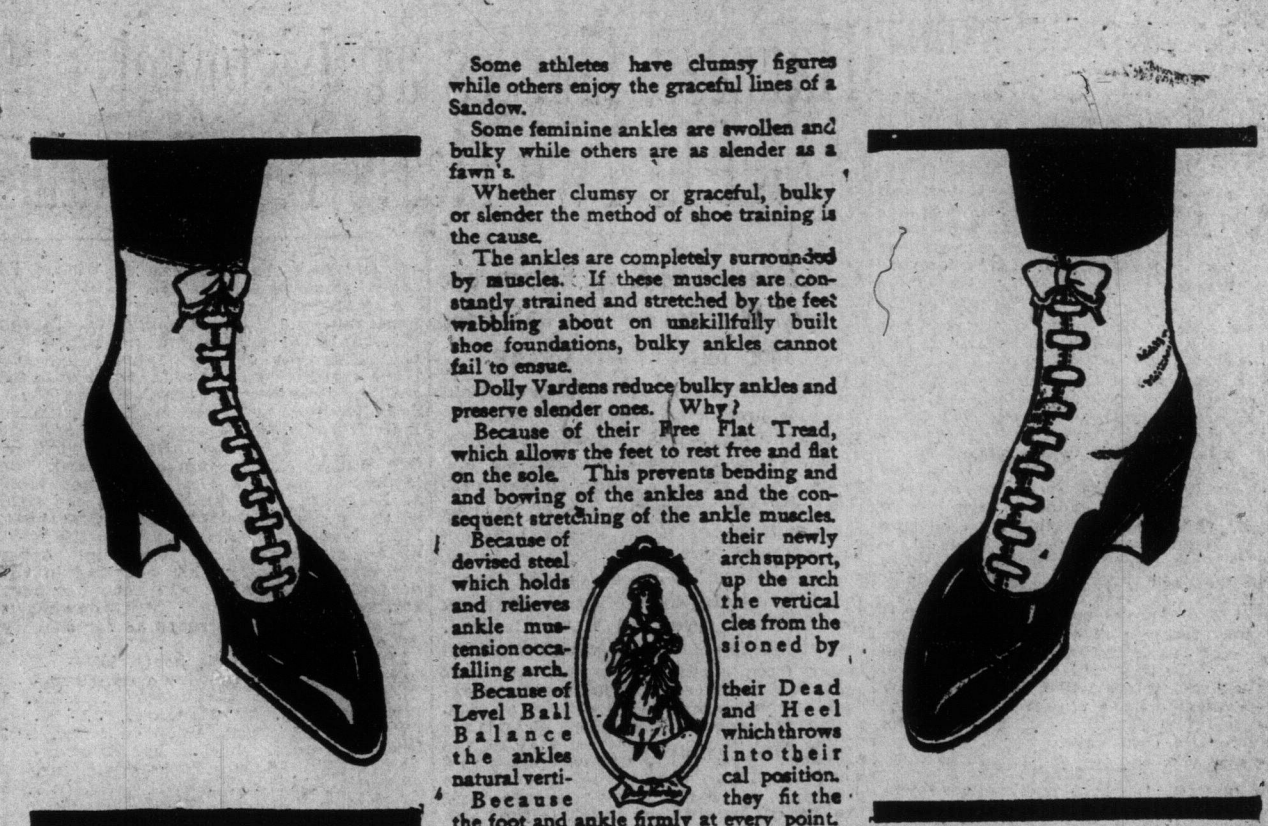
