

# Toronto Cup the Winner :: Lacrosse Toronto Teams Win :: Baseball Saturday and Sunday

## Note and Comment

King James won the Toronto Cup on Saturday, because he made no mistakes under the skillful guidance of Guy Burns. Always in front or thereabouts, ever ready and eager for more, the Plaudit four-year-old was never in trouble at any stage and the answer to those who think the long shot Aronack, that was at one stage sight lengths behind the leader, might have won with better racing luck, are reminded that King James always had a lot in reserve and was going away at the finish. The track was slow and the time four seconds behind the mark set by Minnie Adams last year.

The Toronto Cup contest came up to the highest expectations and as stated in the Sunday World, it was one grand day for devotees of the sport, who enjoyed the races and saw one of the best on any track for any purpose under ideal conditions.

That the crowd of fifteen thousand was immensely pleased with itself was evidenced by the loud and prolonged cheering as the gubernatorial party left the grounds between the fifth and sixth events.

Sure, the public landed everything from the first to the seventh, except Henry O. in the third, that best Bobby Kean always had the second choice was liberally backed. What if some of the bookies were put out of business there will be plenty to fill the vacancies to-day in Pawbrokers' row and the game can go merrily on.

It looks as if the \$500 Brooklyn Handicap to be run at Gravesend next Thursday will have a splendid field. James R. Keene's Celt will surely be to the post as will his stable mate, Hilarious. S. G. Hildreth hustled King James back from the Woodbine and he will start Joe Madden, while Barney Schreiber's Jack Atkin, J. L. McGinnis' Frank Gill, the Newcastle Stable's Wise Man, John D. Madden's Payette, F. A. Forsyth's High Private, August Belmont's Half Sovereign and Samuel Emery's Master Robert, also face the barrier. Celt and King James are the choices when taking public form into consideration, say the turf sharps.

Toronto stood proudly at the top of the Eastern League for some time on Saturday, the hardly sufficient one for you to do it. However, if the Pets never get higher again this year, the answer to settle old subscribers' wagers that he makes around the grounds next winter must be in the affirmative.

## Favorites First On Cup Day at Woodbine Park

**Bobbie Kean, the Only Beaten Choice, Finished Second to Henry O.—Race Track Gossip.**

Toronto Cup Day will long be remembered by devotees of the sport at Woodbine Park. Everything combined to make Saturday the greatest of all days in the history of the Ontario Jockey Club. The weather was ideal, sunshiny and warm, with a beautiful breeze from the north, and best of all King James, the odds-on favorite, landed the feature event by a good length, although High Private or Aronack was always within a head or a neck of him the whole mile and eighth.

His excellency the governor-general arrived once more in state, the Waterloo T. Band from the president's own home playing O Canada and The Maple Leaf as the party drove past the stands and entered the clubhouse lawn.

The attendance was no smaller and no less fashionable than on King's Plate or Victoria Day, easily reaching the fifteen thousand mark. While the crowd was fashionable, it was no less speculative, and most of the day was spent in betting on the races. The odds on King James were 1 to 1, while the odds on High Private were 1 to 2.

Favorites had an almost clean sweep of the card, every one of the seven races except the third going to the first choice, and in it Henry O., the second choice, finished first with Bobbie Kean, the fancy of the public, and the only beaten choice of the afternoon, no worse than second.

An extensive description of the cup race and the other events appeared in The Sunday World.

William Walker won two races as a starter on Saturday, in the third taking down a piece of plate presented to the Beach-avenue turfman by the governor-general on behalf of the Jockey Club.

King James, the winner of the Toronto Cup, leaves to-day for New York, where he will start in the Brooklyn Handicap this week. This horse showed no sign of harm after his race on Saturday and will go to the post in the big event in the pink of condition. Burns also leaves to-night to ride him.

High Private will be shipped back to New York to run in the Brooklyn Handicap. As he has only to carry 102 pounds and should the track prove muddy, his owners think he will have a royal chance. Heavy going is also to the liking of the great horse Celt.

That in any kind of going either King James or High Private will have a worthy competitor.

William Walker is well pleased with the ride that his horse Henry O. got in the gentlemen riders' race. He said after the race that this horse was handled better by Mr. Davies than he was by many professional riders. On Saturday Henry O. was a good horse well ridden.

The Seagram Cup will be the feature event this afternoon and the Kirkfield Stable think that they have a sure thing in this event with the horse Direct. He ran well in the Liverpool and will likely repeat to-day. These two cups were won last spring by Photographers.

The contract of Willie Shields on Charlie Phalar, Jr., commences this afternoon. This boy is now entitled to an apprentice allowance for one year. The boy is one of the best judges of pace at the track and is a fearless rider.

Svanberg First and Hayes Second in Marathon at Chicago.

CHICAGO, May 29.—(Special.)—Svanberg of Sweden won the \$10,000 Chicago Marathon race this afternoon in the time of 2:48.11-5. Johnny Hayes, the winner of the Olympian Marathon, London, was second; Appleby, the English middle distance winner, lasted long enough to finish third. Maloney, the Irish crack, Simpson, the Indian, and Thibau, the Chicagoan, who turned professional for the event, finished in the order named.

St. Yves, the Frenchman, who won the New York Marathon, and Longboat, the fleet Indian, also started, but the fifteenth mile saw the two drop out. Longboat was the first to go. Simpson should have finished better. He was strong when he crossed the line and spurted the last lap.
