Bible in the Schools

Only as Literature

Religious Teaching Should Be Taught, Says Rev. Dr. Rose to Teachers' Association.

"The public schools of to-day should be turned into places of religious technical teaching. The pupils attend the schools for a good education and I am not in favor of the Bible being used for teaching purposes any more than at present. I know many people have advanced the idea of having the Bible taken as a branch of the school curriculum, but if they were granted, then I would be in favor of secular schools," said Rev. Dr. Rose in an address at the annual meeting of the Toronto Teachers' Association yesterday.

"The only manner in which I advocate the Bible being taught is as school literature. The characters portrayed are equal to Napoleon, Caesar and other historical celebrities, but I regret to state I believe the present-day teachers are unqualified for this work. Not that it is their fault, but they have not received the training necessary."

If the teachers could instill high ideals into their pupils then they were worthy of the greatest of praise. Sermonettes were, however, to be taboo. These did more harm than good, but to educate the pupils to do right because it was right was their work.

Chairman Simpson of the board of education in the opening speech again advocated the policy of not sparing the taxpayers for education improvements.

The speaker briefly touched on the new departures in manual training, domestic science and reform in home work. In the latter he advocated the children being given work in which they were deficient, but in no case should the same work be given to the whole class. He also upheld the action of the board in appointing a woman physical instructor for the girls and predicted that within a few years more ladies would be engaged for this work.

The morning sessions were held in Ryerson and Ogden schools. At these meetings discussion took place on the various phases of school work, while a paper was read by Prof. S. B. McCreedy, O.A.C., Guelph, on Home Gardening.

Chipped Beef Omelet.
Take a cupful of chipped beef and shred it well. Cover with boiling water, and let it cook slowly for five minutes. Drain and spread on a cloth. Make an omelet and spread the beef on it, just before folding the omelet.

FOR LUNCHEON OR SUPPER.

Fried Parsnips.
Peel or scrape the parsnips and boil till tender in salted water. Drain and cut in slices lengthwise. Season with salt and pepper, and let them cool. Then dip in flour and fry in drippings till brown.

FOR DINNER.

Almond Soup.
Blanch half a pound of almonds and brown them in the oven. When crisp and hot, mash them to a powder or run

Needlework Notes.

Japan floss is the finest embroidery silk made.

The covering of embroidery hoop rings should be renewed frequently.

Badly torn places in lace may frequently be mended with a little net and the result is exceptionally good.

A dainty gift for a schoolgirl is a white satin ribbon snood on which wee pink rosebuds are embroidered here and there.

A pair of scissors is a handy accessory of the work basket and is very useful in pulling out little ends of baste thread.

The busy housewife who arranges darning day may not know that paraffin rubbed on the heels of stockings reduces friction and saves many a jagged hole.

Embroidery can be cleaned by rubbing the surface with a piece of bread a day old. Use a small piece with the crust still on it, and then throw away as soon as soiled.

If you can work letters neither with a hoop nor without it, compromise on a piece of fine silk, sewed under the letters. Paste outside the portion to be marked, otherwise there is danger.
