YOUTH SLEEPS SOUNDLY WHILE LIFE'S IN BALANCE

Young Albert Wolter is Convicted of Terribly Brutal Murder of Young Girl.

NEW YORK, April 22.—(Special).—Albert Wolter, a youth of 19, who was "crazy" about women, must die in the electric chair for the murder of Ruth Wheeler, a 15-year-old stenographer.

The boy's counsel said this afternoon that Wolter was too tender-hearted to harm a cat, but twelve men decided to-night that he had strangled Ruth Wheeler and thrust her while yet alive into his fireplace, where, soaked with oil, her body burned.

All eyes immediately shifted toward the prisoner, but he was stolid as a piece of stone. As he was being handcuffed to officers, preparatory to being taken back to the Tomb, he gazed about him unconcernedly.

Neither relatives of the murderer nor relatives of the victim were in court to hear the verdict. "I don't want to talk to-night—I'm tired and I want to get a little good sleep first," he said.

Ruth Wheeler was killed on March 24. Wolter was arrested on March 25, and was placed on trial last Monday.
