from church. He quoted figures to prove that in Hamilton the men turned out splendidly, tho a large number of men and women didn't attend church.

He explained that there was a tendency on the part of the wealthy to hide themselves away in exclusive sections of the city and build beautiful churches for themselves, leaving the poor to missions. Then there was not enough self denial practiced, while some thought too much of missions in China and Japan and not enough of the people on their own street, the clerks in the stores or the maids of the kitchen. These things, Mr. Mitchell said, the world took notice of.

Dealing with the case for the church Mr. Mitchell said that people outside it condemned it for something men in it had done outside it, and ignored what the church stood for, and its necessity to society.

NORTH TORONTO, June 26.—(Special.)—One of the big days in the history of Davisville was the annual picnic and sports held on the school grounds on Saturday afternoon and evening. It was a wonderful gathering, and in the air of sociability and genuine free and easy old-fashioned hospitality, Saturday's picnic assuredly carries off the palm. It is reported that 1000 people were regaled with all the good things imaginable, and even then there was enough and to spare.

The sports were held in the school grounds and the 40 odd acres were run off like clockwork, and to the satisfaction of everybody. In the afternoon the school on long tables abundantly laden the seniors were dined, while the juniors feasted on the fat of the land on nearby grounds. Principal A. W. Urmy was a host in himself, while the committee, composed of John Cooke, chairman; Alex. Anderson, treasurer, and "Bob" Ferguson, secretary, together with Mayor Brown, Councillors Frank Howe, Walter Muston, Charlie Murphy, and Messrs. Loveday, Page, Powell, Douglas, Leach, Paxton, Brennan and J. D. Davis made up a group of workers which it would be hard to beat. 
