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METHODIST CHURCH SUPPORTS UNION

Circular Prepared by Social
Service Board to Be Read
to People Tomorrow.

MANY REASONS GIVEN
Party Politics Laid Aside, So
That Reinforcements
May Be Sent.

The executive committee of the
General Board of Social Service and
Evangelism of the Methodist Church
in Canada has issued the following
statement:

The present duty and paramount
responsibility of Canada is to render
every possible assistance, make the
very highest sacrifice, and unite in
the most determined purpose to con-
tribute its full share to win the war
and thus protect the smaller nations
against the menace of an aggressive
militarism, save democracy from
German autocracy and despotism, and
establish the dominance of the
principles of Christ and international
relationships.

Methodism has always been an out-
standing influence in behalf of na-
tional righteousness, democratic in-
stitutions, and equal justice to all
the people. The attitude of Canada
towards this war has been
intensely outspoken. Our last
general conference, in an address to
His Majesty, George V., declared:
"We beg leave as a Church humbly
to express our deepest conviction of
the righteousness of the call which
His Majesty has sent forth to all his
subjects to sustain the honor of the
British Crown, to defend the weak
against ruthless oppression, and to
secure the foundations of human
freedom and brotherhood. Thousands
of our sons and daughters are among
the contingents who have gone from
Canada at the call of His Majesty to
maintain the integrity of British
honor. Some have already sealed
their loyalty in their life blood, as
they have fallen upon land and sea.
Thousands more are ready and wait-
ing at their sovereign's call to follow
their noble example."

The passing years have fulfilled
this promise. Returns from circuits
indicate that upwards of 75,000 Meth-
odists voluntarily enlisted in the Can-
adian Expeditionary Force, and that
400 of our ministers and probationers,
and almost 600 sons and daughters
of Methodists, have been called to
respond to the call of the colors.
Methodism has an inestimable invest-
ment in this war. The many of our
sons and daughters have made the
supreme sacrifice, and multitudes
have been wounded, shell shocked,
gassed, and are returning to us
we have thousands of our
brave and beloved heroes in
France and Flanders. The very
blood of our martyred sons, the sur-
vivors of our boys in the casualty
lists, with the increasing needs of our
men in the trenches, clamantly in-
vite us to do our part. We should
therefore continue to render them
our supreme support, even to
suffering and sacrifice.

All our annual conferences in 1917
were imbued with this spirit and pur-
pose. Each adopted strong declara-
tions in favor of selective conscription
and Union Government.

At the polls on December 17, 1917,
every Methodist elector, the women
as well as the men, should con-
scientiously meet personal responsi-
bility and both vote and work for
the election of a Parliament which
stand with the Union Government—
not for political advantage, but to
enable Canada to do her full duty
to the empire, to herself, and to wait-

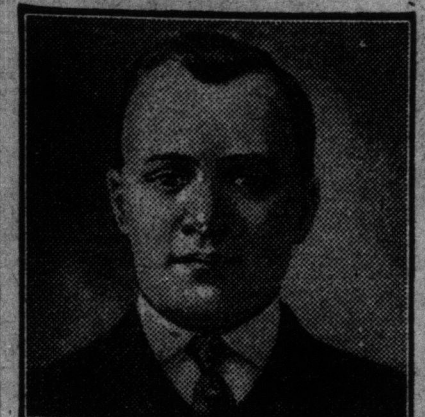

noble soldiers in the trenches and
in training, as well as those who have
given their lives, or are suffering to-
day thru the awful casualties of this
war. Duty and a sense of the value
of our own freedom compel us to
the "stand" and unhesitatingly to
shoulder to shoulder with the other
democracies of the world.

Outstanding among the reasons
for this urgent appeal that our just-
elected representatives for the Union
Government candidates, are the fol-
lowing:

1. In the supreme hour of their
country's need, the Union Government
has declared that the duty to pro-
vide adequate reinforcements of men, foot
and clothing is superior to party
considerations. Party politics are laid
aside, and every resource and utility
enlisted in behalf of the Canadian
Expeditionary Force, the Dominion
of Canada, the British Empire, and
the winning of the war.

2. Canada must not be divided at
this time. British ideals and tradi-
tions must receive the unquestioned
support of all our citizens. It would
be fatal to Canada's place in the em-
pire, and to our position on the great
battlefields of this war, if we were
to permit party differences and local
prejudices to affect the solidarity of
our support of the Union government,
which exists solely to safeguard our
immeasurably valuable asset in our
Canadian Expeditionary Force.

3. The Union government can be
safely entrusted with the fair admin-
istration of the Military Service Act,
protecting the agricultural and indus-
trial interests, while securing the
needed reinforcements for the mili-
tary and naval forces; and the govern-
ment of the country for the benefit of
all her people.

4. The liberty of mankind is at
stake, and until that is assured peace
with Germany is impossible. Do we
realize that if the war were to end
today Germany would have good reason
to regard herself as victorious?
True, she has lost her overseas col-
onies, and the oceans are closed to her
commerce. But on the continent of
Europe she holds the richest indus-
trial region of France, and the most
highly developed portions of Russia,
Rumania and Belgium. All this must
be changed. We must struggle on,
because we are waging a war against
war. The great predatory power that
has terrorized Europe ever since 1864
must be cured of militarism by a
crushing defeat, no other way can
mankind be brought nearer to that
glorious tomorrow when wars shall
cease, inter the earth, and disputes be-
tween nations as between individuals,
shall be settled in court according to
recognized principles of equity. We
must support that government which
will render the most efficient aid to
the motherland and her allies to
achieve this end.

5. Canada's sons in France and
Flanders are fighting for our defence.
They have seen war and know what
it is. To these heroic lads who stand
between us and the savagery of a war-
mad people—a people whose hands
are stained with the blood of innocent
little children slain on land and sea—
shall we say that Canada has done
enough, and that the reinforcements
they need so urgently cannot be sent
because a section of our people, im-
bued with a selfish spirit, and narrow-
ed by partisan influences, refuse? No,
we surely must assure our brave sol-
diers of our confidence and support
by electing the Union government on
Monday, Dec. 17, 1917.

With enthusiastic unanimity, be-
lieving the present duty of every Can-
adian citizen is to support Union
government at the forthcoming elec-
tion, this executive committee of the
board of social service and evangeli-
sm of the Methodist church requests
that this statement be read from our
pulpits and published in the daily and
weekly press. We also urge that every
Methodist having the right to vote will
support the candidates who are sup-
porting the Union government of Can-
ada.

SUCCESS SOUGHT FOR STARVING ARMENIANS

Over a Million Have Been Driven
From Their Homes and Are in
Great Want.

Over 2,000,000 people in Armenia,
Syria and Palestine are starving. Over
1,000,000 Armenians and Syrians have
been driven from their homes, have
been forced into Islam, deported to
northern Arabia or have perished on
the way to exile. Butchery, outrage,
cruelty, starvation are words that do
not begin to picture the horrors the
Armenian Christians have been sub-
jected to.

There is no difficulty in reaching
the sufferers now through the Red
Cross and American consuls. The ad-
vance of the British has made it
easier and thousands are seeking shel-
ter and protection behind the Bri-
tish lines, but the failure of the Rus-
sians in the Caucasus to more than
feed themselves throws \$50,000 more
Armenians upon the mercy of Can-
ada and the United States. Canada
is being asked to do her share by the
Armenian Relief Fund Association of
Canada which is under the patronage
of Hon. W. H. Hearst, premier of On-
tario; Most Rev. Neil McNeil, Arch-
bishop of Toronto; Ven. Archbishop
Cody, D.D., L.L.D.; Hon. Sir
Mulock, K.C.M.G.; Sir Edmund
Walker, C.V.O., L.L.D., and Col. Sir
Henry Pellatt, C.V.O., D.C.L. Further
