HUNS LOSE TRENCHES

Foe's Quarry and Woods Also Fall Before Assault.

took prisoner 150 unwounded men and captured 18 machine guns.

The right bank of the river was the artillery fighting is intense.

"On the Verdun front our first and second lines in the region of Chantilly and in the Douaumont-Pléury sector have been bombarded."

"On the 8th instant an enemy aeroplane was brought down in flames in the line of the river to the south of Douaumont by a pilot of the American squadron."

Belgian communication: "There is nothing to report."

The French afternoon statement follows:

"North of the Somme our artillery directed a desultory fire against the defenses of the enemy. In the course of our operations we took prisoners and captured two machine guns in the small wood northwest of Hardecourt."

"On the left bank of the Meuse (Verdun front) we made a surprise attack on a German trench east of Hill 304 and brought back prisoners. On the right bank of the river there was a usual artillery fighting as well as skirmishing with grenades northwest of Triaumont Wood. On the remaining part of the front intermittent artillery fighting occurred."

"On the night of August 9-10 French aerial squadrons bombarded the railway station and barracks at Vouziers and the station at Bazancourt."

WOUNDED SOLDIER OPERATED ON.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Aug. 11.—Particulars of the wounding of Pte. R. Ratcliffe of the 19th Battalion have been received by his parents here. He is now in the hospital at Woolwich suffering from shrapnel wounds in the abdomen and lower part of back. He was wounded on June 9 and operated on at Poppendene. A later letter states that he was again operated on July 17.

GOOD ROADS PROGRAM FOR LINCOLN COUNTY

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 11.—A good roads program, embracing 129 miles, was today adopted by Lincoln County Council and the third reading of the bill will be considered at the November session. F. H. Keefe, K.C., of Toronto, was chosen as county arbitrator in the dispute with the Hamilton, Grimsby and Beamsville Electric Railway Company over the rental demanded by county. The company's franchise having expired in February, the county's claim is for \$100 per mile through the villages of Beamsville and Grimsby.
