London Sportsman: One result of government control of racing under jockey club rules is the increase in the number of "flapping" meetings. From a sporting point of view this form of amusement has not proved the success anticipated by the promoters, and the reports of the "racing" have not made very exhilarating reading. At one venue in the north of England eleven races were decided in three days, the runners averaged less than four per race, and one of the competitors was pulled out on no fewer than nine occasions. Another figured half a dozen times, and so on. And this is the kind of thing that is permitted to pass under the designation of "sport."
