Regulations for Taking the Vote on April 18

THE Parliament of Canada has recently passed a bill regulating the taking of the vote on the Referendum in Ontario on April 18. The points to remember are as follows:

Every British subject by birth or naturalization, man or woman, resident in the Dominion of Canada one year previous to February 1, 1921, and resident in the Province of Ontario for two months previous to same date, is entitled to vote, unless otherwise disqualified.

Voters' Lists used in the last provincial referendum are the lists to be used in this Referendum, subject to revision. Every voter in an urban polling division must be on the list, and will presumably be on the list only in the division in which he resides.

In incorporated cities and towns of 1,000 population of over, arrangements will be made for receiving applications from any who are not now on the list on March 29 to April 4 inclusive-except Sunday-when for six clear days officers will sit to receive such applica-


In rural polling divisions the voter must be either on the list or be put upon it as a resident and be vouched for

as such by another resident. Both affirmative and negative sides have the right to select scrutineers.
