That being the fact, the supply must stop. not only now, but pereafter, except on terms that Canada and Britain must dictate.

If this means that such a policy "would result in a manner most letrimental to the Canadian nickel industry," then we would hail this ndition of affairs gladly rather than be the means of jeopardizing British supremacy at sea and costing, as it has cost, and will cost, the lives of thousands and thousands of British subjects, our own sons

And we are not to be satisfied with the statement of a company hat only looks at "economic conditions"! You cannot measure the safety of an empire, or the lives of the sons, in dollars, or in work or men, or in tonnage for railways!

Nor must another pound of metal leave Canada, nor another bound be refined outside of our own borders.

We may have to buy out the enterprising company or comnies that are in the business; and we, as a nation, are not afraid of the cost or the risk of thus controlling the nickel monopoly. Dread of Night Assaults Shown — Allies Take Scores of Trenches.

(FRENCH OFFICIAL)

PARIS, Dec. 21, 11 p.m.—The French war office made public a report of an eye-witness of points along the battle line from Dec. 7 to Dec. 15. It says: "During the period from the 7th to the 15th of December the ascendency gained by our infantry has placed us in a position to make in various sections of the front progress which seems to have disturbed the enemy. "The German infantry is more cautious and continuous sniping by them denotes a certain amount of nervousness. The fact that they are using searchlights and lighting rockets more and more reveals also their fears of attacks.

Austrians Are Clamoring for Early Peace.

The diplomat in a cipher telegram confirms recent press reports from Rome of the dissatisfaction which the Austrian populace feels at the lack of the success of its army and states moreover that indignation has been stirred up among all classes because of the recent reverses suffered at the hands of Servia.

The same diplomat's telegram states that reports are persistent in well informed circles in Austria that Italy will declare war against Austria about New Year's Day. These reports emanate, the despatch says, from prominent Italians, but Austrian officials are still consident that Italy will remain neutral.

Petrograd Report Declares Germans in North Poland Are Retreating.

FIGHT IN DEEP SNOW

Sieges of Cracow and Przemysl Are Still Actively Pressed.

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON. Dec. 21, 10.40 p.m.—In Poland and Galicia battles are being fought between the Russians and the German and Austrian allies amid deep snow in bitter cold. In Belgium and

the French, British and Belgian allies are contesting the thick mud fields foot by foot.

No news of any decisive gain came from either arena today. The Russian and German claims continue to be directly contradictory.

The Germans in Poland again are making a fierce attack toward the capital, and the Russians are making a stand against them on the east bank of the Bzura River, 30 miles west of Warsaw. Grand Duke Nicholas' army here holds a natural strategic line 50 miles long, running roughly, north and south along the east banks of the Bzura and Rawka Rivers.

Germans in Retreat.

A Petrograd report claims that the German force in North Poland has retreated across the boundary in East Prussia in a northeasterly direction. It asserts also that the Austrian advance thru the Carpathian passes to the north has been checked, and the attempts of the Przemysl garrison to break thru the lines repulsed. According to this report, the Austrians have been driven into the fortifications with heavy slaughter.
