spirits entrusted to our care, and our fervent prayer is that our "Doctrine shall drop as the rain, as the small rain upon the tender herb, and as the showers upon the grass."

And, we are the more anxious, as the good seed which we have sown, must be tended by other hands, when our children go forth into the world, and its temptations assail them.

In prayerful hope, we now conclude :--

" Lord, we have journeyed on in joy and sorrow,

" And Thou hast made each step an onward one,

"And we will ever trust each unknown morrow,
"Thou wilt sustain us till its work is done,"
