

with them that rejoice" need not be told. The pearls that drop from the eye of sympathy on the one side, and of gratitude on the other, are of more value in the purchase of happiness and in the good produced, than those that glitter in a monarch's crown: like the pearly dew which besprinkle our earth and by their fertilizing virtues produce fragrance, beauty and nourishment, such as the united value of all the pearls that land and sea has ever furnished could not procure.

Some valuable coadjutors in this good work have been removed in the course of the year past. Their names and their place are blank, and remind the survivors in their associations, of the loss they have sustained. But they are encouraged by the consideration that "they are not dead but sleep," that "they rest from their labours and their works do follow them," and that "those who sleep in Jesus will God bring with him," to be for ever with the Lord. They therefore say to themselves and to their friends and benefactors, "Let us not be weary in well doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."
