RAISED \$17,000 FOR RED CROSS SOCIETY

Annual Meeting of Provincial Organization Held Yesterday—Officers Elected

At the annual meeting of the New Brunswick branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society yesterday afternoon in the mayor's office in city hall, officers for the coming year were elected as follows: The annual election of officers took place as follows: President, Mayor Hayes; 1st vice-president, P. Allan Randolph; 2nd vice-president, Philip Grantham; provincial treasurer, Lady Tilley; secretary, Miss Clements; executive, Dr. Bourque, Moncton; Brigadier-General Hugh H. McLean, Mr. FitzRandolph, Lieutenant-Colonel E. T. Sturdee, Dr. J. H. Frink, H. A. Powell, K. C., and the officers. Regret was expressed that Lieutenant-Governor Wood was unable to be present at the meeting. Reports submitted by the secretary, Lady Tilley, and the treasurer, Miss Clements, showed that \$17,971.84 had been collected by the society during the year, in addition to \$17,485 raised for the British Red Cross Society. Of the receipts, \$10,087 had been sent to the Canadian headquarters while the balance had been sent direct to the various institutions at the front for similar purposes. The meeting voted \$800 to the prisoners of war fund.

AMATEURS WON PRAISE OF ALL

'The Climbers' Excellently Played in the Opera House for Patriotic Cause

"I want to congratulate you on your excellent performance and I certainly enjoyed it; I do trust that you will be able to have the play presented in Fredericton." This is from a letter which was sent from one of the boxes last evening in the Opera House to Mrs. A. C. Wilson, who so ably presented "The Climbers" last night. It was written by an outside critic who speaks amply for the success of the performance. The Climbers, a four act comedy-drama by Clyde Fitch, was presented in a very able manner by the local amateurs. It was a thoroughly good performance in every respect and each character was cleverly interpreted. A difficult piece, difficult in the construction and one only undertaken by professionals in larger cities, it is safe to say that it was the best amateur performance seen on the local stage. It was a very ambitious undertaking, but those who so ably acquitted themselves left no room for critics. Those who took part are to be heartily congratulated.

Wm. M. Ryan, well known as a local performer of merit, interpreted a difficult role in a professional manner. His characterization of a man in business difficulties, a man given to drink, a man who betrays every trust placed in his hands and a real climber after wealth and power, was a fine performance. The work was heavy but his acting was excellent.

J. L. Robertson as "the friend of all of us," played a fine part. His interpretation was excellent and he added new laurels to an already good name as an actor of no little merit. Fred McGuire as Johnny Trotter evoked many a good laugh, especially when he would say "Dodo Bird." Weldon Currie in the part of Mr. Mason made a good impression and his part "of the lawyer" was well presented. Hilton Crowley and James Hoyt also played their allotted parts well.

Miss Constance Coster in her initial role as a character that one would despise at first, but later wins admiration. Mrs. S. Herbert Mayes' interpretation of "the old maid" was most praiseworthy. It was a difficult character to play just right, but it was in capable hands and Mrs. Mayes played it well. Miss Dorothy Sutton as one of the Hunter girls, was pleasing and enjoyable in her part. A light juvenile character, she was at all times at home on the stage.

Miss Marjorie Calkin as last evening she played the role of Miss Sillerton in a commendable manner. Mrs. Fred Lewis as Thompson and Miss Josephine Wetmore as Marie were also good in their parts.

A. C. Wilson as the butler played with grace and ease. Too much credit cannot be given to Mrs. A. C. D. Wilson, because a great deal of the success of last night is due to her untiring efforts. "The House Next Door" was a fine performance, but "The Climbers" a still more difficult show, won great praise for her able management. The scenic effects were excellent, especially her preparation of the supper scene, which was one of the best seen here in years, amateur or professional.

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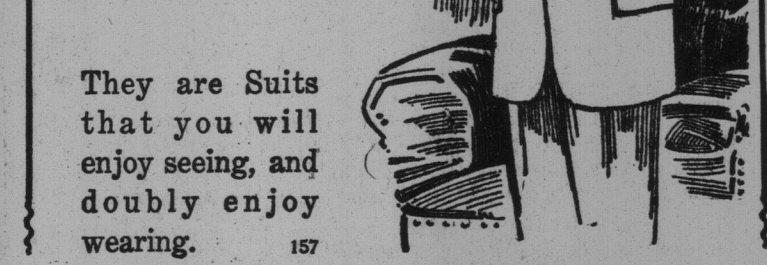
